

Sisters of St. Dominic Establish New School at Southern Pines

The Dominican Sisters are just installing the REGINA SANCTORUM (Queen of All Saints) ACADEMY, for the purpose of aiding parents in this vicinity whose children have been taking up a standard course of study in either academic or pre-academic studies, and who wish the education of their children should not be interrupted during their sojourn in the South.

The Sisters came from New York about a week ago and have taken the house in Southern Pines formerly known as "The Colton House." This house is situated at the corner of May Street and Connecticut Avenue. It is but a short distance on the road to Fayetteville, Raleigh and Manley and so the new convent has a most convenient location. The house is one of the best of the older houses in Southern Pines and is equipped with steam heat, electric lights, etc. etc. Some of the larger rooms are being turned into very attractive class rooms. A Chapel and a studio will also be equipped in the near future.

The Academic Department is to be open from 9 to 12 A. M. and offers the usual high school curriculum. Terms \$20.00 per month.

The Seventh and Eight Grammar School Grades offer Elementary French and Drawing in the regulation course. Hours 1 to 3:30 P. M.; Terms \$15.00 per month.

The Pre-Academic Department for small children, includes the elementary grade work and Primary French. Hours 9 to 12 A. M.; Terms, \$12.00 per month.

The Sisters offer private lessons in French, Spanish and Latin. They also are prepared to give special work in Drawing, in Light and Shade, Still Life, Crayon Portraits, Water Color, Oil Painting, Tapestry Painting, China Painting, Miniature and French Pen Painting. Fee—\$3.00 per hour or \$5.00 for two hours. As soon as the school is equipped with a piano, lessons in Voice Culture and Instrumental Music will be given. The Sisters desire it to be known that any equipment given for the Chapel, Studio or Class Rooms will be most thankfully received and that children of any creed will be welcome in the Academy.

tion last Summer; Mr. Arthur Newcomb took over what was left of the Page Estate in that direction and also the 800 acres owned by J. H. Ehrehart. Before this deal was closed J. V. Healy and C. P. Mason had relieved Newcomb of 100 acres of pine grove between Lattings and Marrs.

J. R. Page, who owns what little is left of the original tract beyond Linden, has built a very attractive cottage and planted 20 acres of Elberta and Belle trees in the fork of the Jackson Springs road just beyond the big orchard.

The scarcity of available high land around town has induced S. B. Chapin to divide his large holding on the railroad beyond the race course. 300 acres was sold to Fred Page of Aberdeen, and

200 to L. E. Pender of Pinehurst. Ralph Page bought 125 for a Boston client, still unidentified, including the famous Pine Grove. One hundred and twenty-five acres on the railroad opposite Vina Vista is being put into trees this week, and a saw-mill is working over time to cut the timber for dwellings and packing house. It looks as though the Garran Hill development would be duplicated at Vina Vista within the year.

Possibly of more importance than any of this to the future of the Sand-

hills is the progress at the Drowning Creek Plantation. Even more than upon peach trees, tobacco and climate, we bank upon the quality and capacity of the people that live here and that are coming here in ever increasing numbers. A hundred acres of one year trees and a very beautiful residence just finished beyond the Derby place are tangible evidence of another welcome addition to the Plantation colony. This is John Tuckerman of Boston, who is moving here this month with his family. The adjoining property has been purchased by another well known Bostonian, Richard Lovering, who has already bought 10,000 trees to put in his clearing, is contracting the building of a house, and is in the meantime to live here in Pinehurst with his family.

These two will add mightily to the Sandhill team.

This is by no means a comprehensive account of the development in peaches these last three months. The same story has been repeated in Southern Pines, Lakeview, Aberdeen, Hoffman, Marston and West End. Alexander Ogden Jones of New York, a brother-in-law of Raphael W. Pumpelly's, already well known and influential in the Sandhills, has bought the orchard and vineyard and pecan grove at Niagara, and contemplates going into scuppernongs. Another week we will give further news of the march of events in the bucolic world, including an account of the Peach Growers' Association that bids fair to usurp the kudos recently belonging to the Sandhill Board of Trade.



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
