Johnson is custodian of Lincoln's tomb here and is one of the three surviving witnesses to the exhuming of the martyred president's body when it was removed to its final resting place under the big monument in Oak Ridge cemetery here.
Washington-After battling with the seas for nearly a week, four of the five American Submarines that have been missing between the Bermuda Islands and the coast, arrived at Hampton Roads, Virginia, according to a dispatch received at the Navy Department.

Detroit-The Maintenance of Way Workers and The Railway Shopmen won't pay any attention to an injunction issued to restrain them from striking, A. T.
