The North and South Handicap, run on Tuesday afternoon, was a contest of five events, 20 targets each, and when the smoke had cleared off the field there was discovered a four-cornered tie between the redoubtable Khoehle, from the 21 yard line, U. R. Brooks, of Columbia, S. C., from the 19 yard line, Rowland Pittman, of Whitakers, N. C., and Robt. Shelor, of Sumter, S. C., the last two shooting from the 18 yard line. Each man broke 92 out of 100. On the shootoff of 20 targets, Pittman won the Handicap Title with a break of 19 out of the 20. He slipped up on his very last bird.

The events of greatest interest at the shoot were the North Carolina State Championships. The winner of the 300 sixteen yard contest who is resident in this state is annually declared the State Champion and receives a trophy donated by the A. T. A. In addition this year the winner-or runner-up-will have his railroad and Pullman fare, to and from the Grand American Handicap, paid by the A. T. A., conditional upon his attending G. A. H. and competing in the National Amateur Championship at single targets.
