Howe and his professional colleague Wilson had a best ball of 68.

Another interesting amateur-professional match played on the same day was that of Donald Parson of Chevy Chase and Charles Mothersele, Pinehurst professional and Maine Open Champion, who defeated A. L. Blue of Aberdeen and Emmet French, Youngstown professional, by 3 and 2. Parson and Mothersele indulged in some excellent team work and finished with a best ball of 71.
