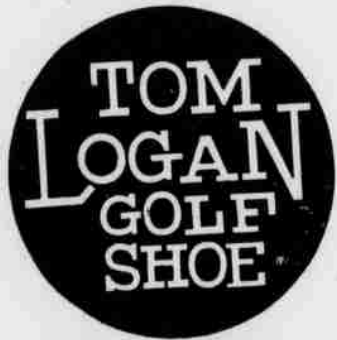

BUILDING AND LOAN ASSO- CIATION FORMED AT PINEHURST

The initial meeting of the Pinehurst Building and Loan Association, a new organization formed at Pinehurst to assist and encourage the permanent residents of the village in building homes and saving their earnings, was held on Tuesday night of last week. Mr. William N. Swain, former president of The Co-operative Bank League of Massachusetts, was present and assisted with the details of forming the company. Of those present 20 original incorporators were obtained, who in turn elected the following directors: Richard Tufts, J. I. O'Brien, O. H. Stutts, G. M. Cameron, Carl Buckan, L. E. Pender and I. C. Sledge. Richard Tufts was elected president; I. C. Sledge, vice-president, and L. D. Gardner, Secretary.

The first series of 1000 shares of stock at par will be issued January 1, of which 254 shares were subscribed at the initial meeting, and will be issued in quarterly series thereafter. The stock is non-taxable and will be sold on initial payments of 25 cents per share with weekly installments of the same amount per share. All shares to mature when the profits made by the Association make the value of the oldest series \$100.00 per share. Details for dividends on prepaid stock will be worked out later.

NOVEL FEATURES CONN- ECTED WITH ANNUAL MID- WINTER HANDICAP

Two novel and interesting features of the Fourteenth Annual Midwinter Handicap Target Tournament, which is to be held at Pinehurst on January 17 to 22, is the Anniversary Event, a new event added this year, and the renewal of the sectional contest in which the Eastern experts will compete against the Western aggregation.

The Anniversary Event is to be a yearly fixture and provides for the winners of previous Pinehurst Midwinter Handicaps to compete for the Anniversary Trophy which will be awarded to the shooter making the highest score on a total of 200 targets made up of the 100 targets in the preliminary and the 100 targets in the Midwinter Handicap. In view of such winners as C. W. Billings, Harry T. Edwards, Dr. D. L. Culver, C. H. Newcomb, H. W. Kahler, J. E. Jennings, S. A. Huntley, W. G. Ramsey, Ira Galbraith, A. G. Healey, Wm. Wettleaf, and D. W. Baker, it is evident that exceptionally high-class shooting will be the order of the day.

All of the 300 or more contestants that are likely to take part in the three days' general average contest, 450 targets at 16 yards will be eligible for the sectional Team Race, but the team proper for each section will be limited to the five Eastern and five Western guns scoring the highest number of breaks for the three regular days. The dividing line between the East and West is to be the western boundary of the states of Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee and Mississippi.
