A STATEMENT CONCERNING MID-PINES COUNTRY CLUB, INC.

ITS PERSONNEL

The Mid-Pines Country Club was planned and is sponsored by Knollwood Inc., whose directors are: James Barber, New York City and Pinehurst, N. C., president; Leonard Tufts, Pinehurst, N. C., vice-president and general manager; Arthur S. Newcomb, Pinehurst, N. C., secretary and treasurer; Donald J. Ross, Pinehurst, N. C., L. M. Boomer, (Waldorf-Astoria), New York City; H. B. Swoope, Madera, Pa., and Pinehurst, N. C.; H. H. Rackham, Detroit, Mich.; H. A. Page, Jr., Aberdeen, N. C.; J. W. Corrigan, Cleveland, Ohio; S. B. Richardson, Southern Pines, N. C.; Thomas A. Kelley, Southern Pines, N. C.; J. T. Johnson, Aberdeen, N. C.

These men have all become shareholders in the Mid-Pines Country Club by virtue of the land they are deeding to it and the work they are putting into its development. It is the purpose to add to this nucleus a group who will prove generally acceptable to one another and the stockholders already interested.

The founders of the Mid-Pines Country Club are either residents of the immediate vicinity, or annual guests of many years' standing at Pinehurst or Southern Pines. ITS REASON FOR BEING

A careful estimate of actual applications for rooms in Pinehurst for the past few years shows that it has been necessary to turn away from there each year some 15,000 people who wanted to come in February and March. Nor could these people be cared for by Southern Pines hotels. All the available houses for rent in Southern Pines and Pinehurst could be let many times over if all the applications received each year were filled. The wonderful climate and the sporting facilities which these kindred resorts have developed during the past 25 years seem to have rendered the attractions of the section so irresistible that people are willing to go to almost ridiculous lengths to attain them.
