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J. D. CHAPMAN WINS

trapped beyond the green, whereas Paton was on in three. Chapman got a half by sinking a 20-foot putt. At the eighth both dropped long putts for three's, and at the ninth Chapman holed out from off the green to win the hole and become one up. Chapman was out in 37 and Paton in 39.

Chapman holed a 25 foot putt to halve the tenth in four. Paton won the eleventh with a four, but at the twelfth Chapman gained a lead of a hole by sinking another long putt. The thirteenth was halved in four's. Paton had a splendid opportunity to win the fourteenth, as Chapman hooked into the woods from the tee, then hit a tree and stayed in the rough on his third and was trapped on his fourth. Chapman pitched from the trap to the hole-side for a six. Paton drove down the middle, but tossed away his opportunity by taking three more to get on. They halved in six.

Chapman was down in a long putt for a winning three at the fifteenth and Paton won the sixteenth with four. Both failed to drive the trap at the short seventeenth and they halved in four. The eighteenth was halved in four and settled the contest.

The morning had been ideal for golf, but a hard shower came up in the early afternoon which turned the greens and fairways into a sea of water, and the finalis's had to fairly swim their way around. The referee suggested a postponement on several occasions, but Parson and Chapman stuck to their task and played it through, discarding their putters almost entirely and using pitch shots on the greens.

Both players hit fine drives down the center of the first fairway. No advantage was gained by either player until Parson played a winning 4 at the fourth hole, and from then on it was nip and tuck, never more than one hole separating the two contestants.

At the eighth and ninth holes the greens were covered with water. Chapman chipped into the eighth cup with his mashie from off the green, the ball going in on the second bounce for a two, and Parson did the same thing at the ninth. Parson was one up at the turn.

It was even again when Chapman won the eleventh with a five and took the lead at the thirteenth with another five. The match was squared at the sixteenth with a four by Parson. At the seventeenth, both chipped close with their second shots, but Parson missed a short putt and Chapman took the lead. Chapman's 6 halved the eighteenth and won the trophy, 1 up.
