FAMOUS DOGS ENTERED

For the Annual Dog Show At Pinehurst, April 7--8

Several of the country's leading champion shepherds and greyhounds have been entered for the annual A. K. C. Show to be held at Pinehurst on April 7 -- 8, and the indications are that when the entries close on March 25th the list, so far as class of entrants is concerned, will make the show the most important one that has ever been held in the south.

The latest entries among the Poms include Mrs. O. E. Lakeland's Pioneer Wee Blackie, a champion of champions for which Mrs. Lakeland paid \$5,000. Wee Blackie and his mate, Champion Miss Stoker, won their championships at the Waldorf, in 1917, against a field of 157 dogs and have not been beaten since. Their owner is the only exhibitor whose dogs of the same breed ever won two championships on the same day. Other Poms entered within the last few days include Mrs. A. Marie Lyon's Champion Lady Skylark and her brother, Chief Skylark, both descended from Champion Wee Blackie and accorded best in show on a number of recent occasions.

The Presbyterian Church, organized last June, has charge of the services the first and third Sunday evenings.


Rev. Mr. Cheatham very generously gives his services the other Sunday evenings.
