While playing in the Silver Foils tournament against Bogey on Monday last, Mrs. Donald Ross holed a full brassie shot on the fourteenth hole of Number 1 course.

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Oswald Kirby, the Metropolitan champion, and Al Mendes were among the newcomers during the week. Kirby started his first round with 6's at the first and second holes, but soon recovered and wound up with a 76 for the round.

Kingsley of New York, ex-Secretary John Barton Payne, F. H. Ecker of New York, and Thaddeus C. Bell of Richmond. At the last account these gentlemen stood all even in their medal score tourney and propose to settle the issue during this week.

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In course of a best-ball match played on the championship course on Saturday last, Mrs. Ronald H. Barlow and Emmet French turned in a best ball of 67 and won by a comfortable margin against Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd and Parker W. Whittemore. French went around in 36-33-69, and was assisted on two holes by Mrs. Barlow, whose individual round was 85 and was the only one of the quartette to get a 3 on the sixth hole. French's fine round began with birdies on the first, third and fifth holes and ended with a putt from off the green for a birdie 3 on the difficult eighteenth. One of the outstanding features of the round was Whittemore's 33 for the return trip. He did not hit his stride until after the turn had been made and took 40 for the first nine, but came strong on the last nine and barely missed getting a record of 32. His score was 40-33-73. This was Mrs. Barlow's farewell match for the season at Pinehurst, as she will sail on April 2 for England, where she will compete in the British championship event.
