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BIG YEAR ON THE TRACK

More Than a Hundred Horses on Hand

With more than a hundred horses on hand for the opening of the racing season on Thanksgiving day, the Jockey Club is making extensive preparations for this branch of sport and indications are that it will be a big year on the track. The grandstand has been doubled in size, the addition including three tiers of boxes, seven boxes each and each box containing eight seats, which will be rented for the season or by the day, as conditions may be, and will provide ample seating capacity for the race-lovers who turn out in large numbers every race day.

Many new stables will be seen under colors for the first time at Pinehurst. This includes Penny Brothers, who are here with a string of eight, and the Plaxico Stable, one of the most formidable in the harness division, has a large string on hand. C. C. Coddington has sent over a dozen head, and W. Whiting has brought along a stable of eight. Others that will be on hand for the opening are H. B. Swoope with six; Nat S. Hurd, with four; W. P. Wickert, six; M. Kelly, eight; W. Wickersham, four; L. Sebree, six, and a number of other stables with from two to eight.

The local plant is one of the most complete racing establishments in the country outside the major circuits. It has separate tracks for runners and harness horses, and over in the infield is a steeplechase course with four hurdles. It is laid out so as to have the starting point in the lower left hand corner of the field, thence diagonally across to the first jump, then three times around making a chase of approximately two miles with twelve jumps, and brings together some of the best cross-country performers in training.

that almost caused "an embarrassment of riches", but this was alleviated by limiting the number of shares to only one subscriber. In 1919, five years later, the deposits had grown to \$345,000.00, and it was decided that conservatism and sound banking principles demanded an increase in the capital, and additional stock was sold, mostly to the original stockholders, to make the total \$100,000.00. The deposits in 1921 have reached \$510,000.00.

orchard overlooking the beautiful valley of Linden.

On Sandy Run Road marvelous things have happened. Three years ago this whole territory was covered with scrub oaks—nothing but wild land. When suddenly Aladdin rubbed his lamp and, presto! now we have immense peach orchards, dwellings, tenant houses, pack houses and even a store.

Messrs. Smith & Company, who for many years have conducted a general store at Taylorsville, have completed there new building and meat market at the corner of Sandy Run and Linden Road and are moving in their stock and opening new goods. By the time this is printed they will have a modern department store in full swing with a meat department equipped with a cold storage plant and all approved appliances. This is a most substantial addition to the community and reflects great credit on the owners.

About a quarter of a mile from this store Mr. J. V. Healy is occupying his bungalow which was completed last spring. This house stands on an eminence and from its porches may be seen the new orchards of Peachland, Incorporated, Dr. W. L. Kingsley, of Rome, N. Y. Hilltop, Incorporated, Mr. Frank Dudgeon and Mr. John Lloyd.

Mr. J. W. Latting is busy assembling a force of front line men in preparation for an assault on one hundred acres of his estate, and upon completion this clearing will be planted in peach trees and another large orchard added to the fast increasing number in the neighborhood.

Dr. M. W. Marr has also been seized with agromania, which of course, is only natural in view of the exposure to which he has been subjected in the past few years, and he, too, has broken out with an aggravated case. He has planted an orchard on his three hundred and twenty acre tract which he bought of H. A. Page, Jr.

Numerous other sales have been made which will result in more clearing in the future and before many years what was looked upon as a barren waste will be one of the most intensively cultivated sections of Moore County.
