could frequently negotiate difficult lies.
He pointed out that it would be a simple
matter to mark the flag staffs on each
hole with the stymie measure of two
feet and for players to have the dis-
tance marked on putter shafts.

He also declared that the stymie pro-
vides a true element of luck which all
sports should have.

Mr. Strawn and others who are
prominent in American golf have told
Mr. Ross that they consider this plan
practical and a fine solution of the prob-
lem. Mr. Strawn stated that he would
muster as many influential golfers as
possible to work for the adoption of
this plan at the annual meeting of the
association next week.
