MISS ELIZABETH GORDON

Leads Qualifiers in Women's St. Valentine's

Miss Elizabeth Gordon, a member of the Metacomet Club, Providence, and four times winner of the Rhode Island championship, won the medal in the qualifying round of the annual St. Valentine's Tournament for Women with a score of 48-46-94. Mrs. John D. Chapman of Greenwich, was second with 49-48-97, and Mrs. Joseph Bydolek of Buffalo, finished three strokes behind, at 53-47-100.

Fifty-three participants took part in the qualifying round and were divided into divisions of eight for match play. Miss Gordon is the favorite in the first division, although Mrs. Chapman has played many low rounds on the Pinehurst links and is considered to have a fine chance. The draw for match play in the first division placed these ladies on opposite sides, and it is very likely that they will meet in the finals.

Mrs. Frank S. Danforth of North Fork, heads the second division players with 55-55-110, while Mrs. F. H. Mahan, St. Davids, and Mrs. C. S. Waterhouse, Ardsley, lead the third and fourth divisions respectively.

"North Carolina in 1921 stands with the leaders agriculturally, with a rank of fourth in the 22 leading crops, and fifth in the value of all crops." So says Statistician Frank Parker.

"With a total value of \$228,900,000 for the field crops, North Carolina has only Texas, Illinois, and Iowa surpassing her, while in the aggregate value of all crops we surpass Iowa, but let California and New York ahead. The fruit crops are responsible for these two states getting up front.

"North Carolina produced last year more than four per cent of the value of all crops in the United States, yet she has only 1.6 per cent of the improved farm area of the Union."
