## C. L. BECKER LEADS THE SENIORS IN MEDAL **PLAY TOURNEY**

The second annual Seniors' tournament played on March 18 and 20 brought out a field of forty-five contestants, all of whom were fifty-five years of age and over, and competition was keen throughout the two days' play. The tournament consisted of 18 holes medal play each day, and prizes were awarded for the best gross for 36 holes and best net each day.

C. L. Becker led the field in the race for low gross honors and won the major prize with rounds of 86-84-170, three strokes ahead of his nearest competitor, S. M. Gorman of Altoona, Pa., who finished second at 89-84-173. George T. Dunlap of Canoe Brook, took third honors, at 94-86-180, and was followed by H. C. Fownes of Oakmont, 93-89-182, and W. S. Van Clief, 89-95-184. The prize for the best net the first day was won by C. S. Strout of Biddeford, Me., with a round of 96-25-71, and W. S. Van Clief was second with 89-13-76. Mr. Strout surprised himself by doing a gross 96, the best score he has made since he started playing golf just a year ago.

In the second day's play, S. M. Gorman won the net prize with 84-14-70, and was followed by George T. Dunlap, at 86-12-74.

The Seniors' was started last year by Mr. Frank Presbrey, president of the United States Seniors' Golf Association. Mr. Presbrey was scheduled to play in this season's event but was prevented on account of late train connections.

Arthur Yates, former Yale Football st ar, and A. L. Walker, Jr., winner of the St. Valentine's tournament, who have been setting a fast pace over the Pinchurst links.

A team match between Pinehurst and Florida golfers has been arranged to be played at Pinehurst just prior to the North and South championships. Pinehurst golfers wired a challenge to their ' Florida brothers last week and within twenty-four hours an acceptance had been received.

All the details have not been arranged. but it is likely that there will be ten players on each side and in order to be eligible for play each member must have played golf at one of these places for at least a month this season.

Donald Parson is to captain the Pinehurst team, and C. J. Dunphy of Palm Beach, and H. B. Martin of Belleair, will look after the interests of the Florida team.

The match will be a fine attraction and is certain to develop some keen competition. Florida holds a strong hand in some of the top-notch golfers and Pinehurst will be able to put a fine team in the field. Jesse Guilford, nationl amateur champion, has spent considerable time in Florida this winter and will probably be the number one man for that team. Tom Armour, another crack player, is spending the winter at Belleair, and will be on the team. Joe Schlotman, winner of the recent Bellpair tournament, Elisworth Augustus, the long driver, and C. J. Dunphy are others that will add great strength to the team from the palms. Pinehurst will have Donald Parson, John D. Chapman, "Buck" Merriman, the North and South title last Lucien Walker, and a number strong players.
