## **Reds Defeat Blues**

The Tin Whistles' Reds versus Blue match, played on the Number 2 course on Friday last, resulted in a victory for the Reds by a margin of two points.

This tournament was played on the Nassau system of scoring with three points to a match-one point for the winner of the first nine holes, one point for the winner of the second nine and one point for the winner of the match. When the first or second nine holes or the match is halved, each player gets half a point credit,

Forty-two members ttook part in the tournament, and the twentyone pairs representing the Reds rolled up a total of 321/2 points as against 301/2 for the Blues.

C. B. Hudson carried off the prize awarded for the best net score, and Jack Jolly and Fred Kennedy, the well-known and popular golf ball representatives, donated a box of their famous golf balls for the second and third low net scores. These were won by W. E. Truesdell and Herman Ellis, each of whom wound up the round with net scores of 73.

The following day, the Whistles staged a four-ball best-ball versus par tournament which was won by W. T. Barr and R. C. Steese, who finished 5 up on the par figures. Second prizes in this event were won by Rev. T. A. Cheatham and P. B. O'Brien, who came in 3 up. Three other pairs, C. L. Becker and S. H. Patterson; J. D. Chapman and H. G. Phillips, and James Barber and A. L. Reed, came in on the high side of par, but sixteen pairs failed to equal the given figures.
