JACKSON — The Northampton County Sheriff's Department is looking for a 20-foot long section of drainage pipe tall enough for a child to walk through, last seen on a truck in the vicinity of Murfreesboro.

S. T. Ricks of the State Highway Maintenance Department stated that the three quarter ton drainage arch metal pipe had been stolen less than two hours after it had been dropped with a second section near Pleasant Grove Church at 2:30 last Thursday afternoon. The 57-inch tall unit was to be installed the next morning. He said no less than one-half dozen men or power equipment would have been needed to load the pipe onto a truck.

Sheriff Outland said the truck and the pipe were reported seen moving eastward on U.S. 159 at Faison's Old Tavern and then near Murfreesboro.
