AHOSKIE — The Ahoskie Pony League All-Stars won the Tri-County League championship Friday night at home as they edged Woodland 2-1 to take the best-of-three series in two straight.

Ahoskie won the series opener 10-2 at Woodland Thursday afternoon.

With the win, Ahoskie completes its season with a record of 14 victories and one defeat. Ronnie Riddick hurled a five-hitter to get his twelfth win against a single loss this season for Ahoskie. John Parker and Billy Futrell combined to pitch a five-hitter for Woodland.

The locals scored both of their runs in the third inning on an error and singles by David Overton, John Heimcamp, and Tommy Tucker.

The losers tallied their only run in the sixth frame when Walter Jessup singled, moved to second on an error, and scored on Dennis Joyner's double.

Leading Ahoskie at the plate was David Overton, who collected two hits in three at bats. Walter Jessup went two for three to pace Woodland offensively.

The Ahoskie victory was aided greatly by two outstanding defensive plays. With two out and two on in the fourth frame, Ahoskie centerfielder David Overton made a spectacular diving catch of a sure home run ball. Three innings later, the locals' second

baseman Tommy Tucker made a leaping grab of a hard line drive to rob a Woodland batter of a would-be base hit.

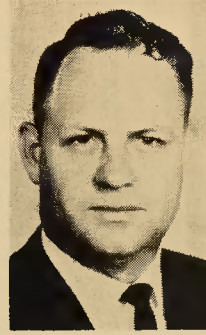

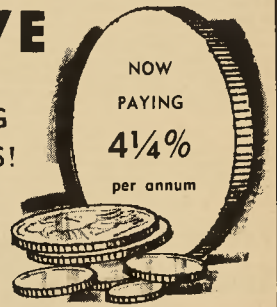
