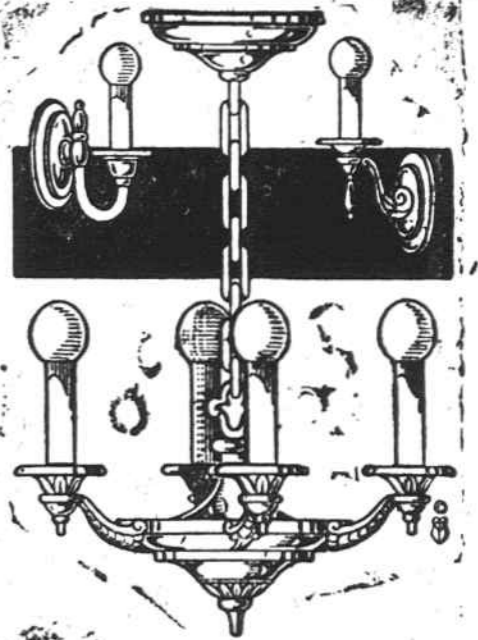
North Carolina, Jackson County

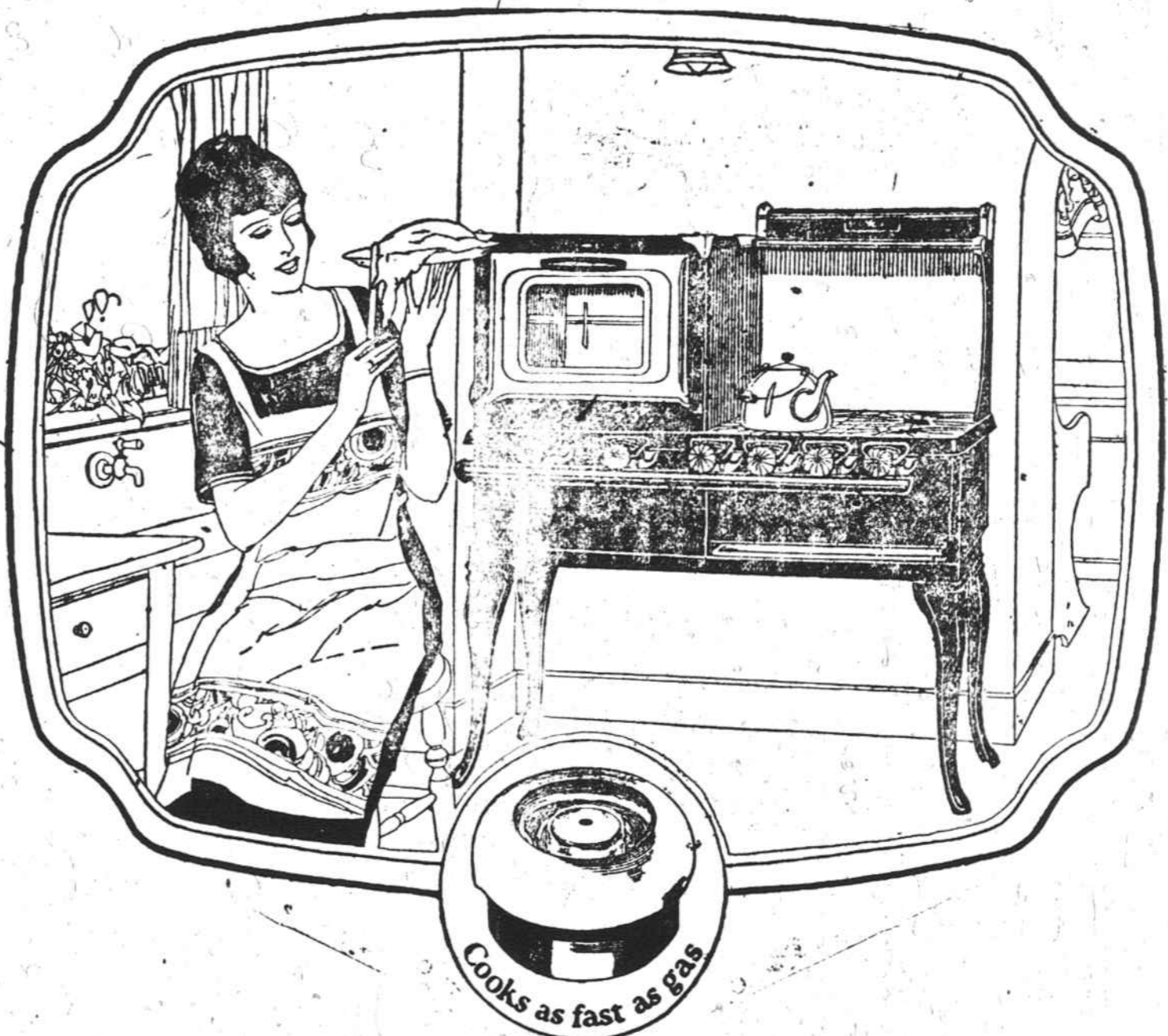
