Be it resolved by the Board of

Commissioners of the Town of Sylva: Section 1. The aggregate principal amount of the Local Improve ments hereby levied against the abut ting property owners on either side of main Street for the purpose of paying one-third of the cost of paying Main Street on either side to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission is \$6426.34, or \$2.00 per lineal foot frontage, the same being authorized by an Ordinance duly passed by the said Board of Commissioners of the Town of Sylva on the 3 day of July, 1923.

Section 2. That the said levy here by made is for the purpose of paying one-third (1-3) of the cost of paving Main Street, extending from either side towards the center of said Street to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission, the same being a public necessity and for Local Improvement, and the usefulness of said improvement is about Twenty Years.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZing theLocalImprovement Assessing Againsts the AbttuingPropertyOwners on eitherSide ofMain Street for the Purpose of Paying One-Third of the Cost of Paving Main Street on Either Side to That Portion Paved by the State Highway Commission in the Town of Sylva, Jackson County, North Carolina, Amounting to the Sum of \$6426.34.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN OF SYLVA:

Section 1. That in pursance of the provisions of the Municipal Fivance Act, Chapter 106, Public Laws, Extra Session, 1921, of North Carolina, and the Acts amendatory thereto, and sections 2703 to 2728 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, to be known as Local Assessments levied on the abutting property owners on either side of Main Street in the Town of Sylva, Jackson County, N. C., for the purpose of paying one-third of the cost of paying either side of Main Street to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission, the Local Assessments levied amounts to the sum of \$6426.34, the same being necessary expenses for the Town of Sylva; towit: for the purpose of paying onethird of the cost of paving the Streets of the Town of Sylva for its

Section 2. That the assessments have been made and are on file in the Office of the Secretary and Treasurer and Clerk to the Board of Aldremen of the Town of Sylva, and the assessments levied are payable in four years, one-fourth each year, the installments bearing Six Per Cent interest from and after the first publication of this ordinance.

Section 3. That the following matters are hereby determined and declared pursuant to the requirements of sections 2918 to 2969 inclusive of the Municipal Finance Act of the Extra Session, 1921, and the Acts Amendatory to said sections:

(a) A statement of the indebtedness of the Town of Sylva has been made and filed with the Town Clerk pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, and is open to public inspection.

(b) The averaged assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the Town of Sylva for the three fiscal years in which the taxes were last levied, as shown by the said statement, is \$1,766,575.00.

(e) The amount of the net debt of the Town of Sylva out standing, heretofore incurred, as follows: 1914, Court House bonds \$15,000.00; 1919 Sewer System Bonds \$25,600.00; 1919, Water System Bonds \$75,000.00 1922, Local Improvement Bonds \$20,000.00, total for bonds \$135,000,-00, amounts due banks in the form of notes \$2500.00, total/indebtedness \$137,500.00, less uncollected local assessments levied, the sum of \$6426,34.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall be published once a week for four successive weeks after its final passage, as required by the Municipal Finance Act, and the Acts Amendatory thereto.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect on and after its first publication. The assessments herein levied is for a public necessity: to-wit: for paying one-third of the cost of paving either side of Main Street in the Town of Sylva.
