RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR

The Aggregate Amount of Levy for Local Improvements, Maturities, Interest Payments, Etc., of \$6426.34, or \$2.00 Per Lineal Foot Frontage, on Paying One-Third of the Cost of Paving Either Side of Main Street of the Town of Sylva, Jackson County, North Carolina, Authorized by an Ordinance Adopted July 3, 1923.

It is resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Sylva:

Section 1. The aggregate principal amount of the Local Improvements hereby levied against the abutting property owners on either side of Main Street for the purpose of paying one-third of the cost of paving Main Street on either side to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission is \$6426.34, or \$2.00 per lineal foot frontage, the same being authorized by an Ordinance duly passed by the said Board of Commissioners of the Town of Sylva on the 3 day of July, 1923.

Section 2. That the said levy hereby made is for the purpose of paying one-third (1/3) of the cost of paving Main Street, extending from either side towards the center of said Street to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission, the same being a public necessity and for local improvement, and the usefulness of said improvement is about Twenty Years.

Section 3. That the said assessments hereby levied against the property abutting Main Street in said Town shall be divided into four (4) equal payments, one, two, three and four years, and all deferred payments or installments to bear six (6) per cent interest from the date the levy is completed as provided in said Ordinance, and the payments to be made in the fall of the years 1923, 1924, 1925 and 1926, when other taxes are due and payable, and the payments to be numbered one, two, three and four. Each principal and interest to be due and payable on the dates herein named, and the same to be paid to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Sylva or to the Town Tax Collector, and the same to be paid in lawful money of the United States of America.

Section 4. That the amounts and sums hereby assessed or levied against the abutting property on either side of Main Street shall be and the same is hereby declared to be a lien on all real property abutting on either side of Main Street and the same shall be in full force and effect from the date of said assessments or levies until the same shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, as provided by law in such cases. Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 106, public laws of the Extra Session, 1921, of North Carolina, and the Acts amendatory thereto, and sections 2703 to 2728 inclusive of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE LOCAL IMPROVEMENT ASSESSING AGAINST THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS ON EITHER SIDE OF MAIN STREET FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING ONE-THIRD OF THE COST OF PAVING MAIN STREET ON EITHER SIDE TO THAT PORTION PAVED BY THE STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION IN THE TOWN OF SYLVA, JACKSON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF \$6426.34.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN OF SYLVA:

Section 1. That in pursuance of the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 106, Public Laws, Extra Session, 1921, of North Carolina, and the Acts amendatory thereto, and sections 2703 to 2728 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, to be known as Local Assessments levied on the abutting property owners on either side of Main Street in the Town of Sylva, Jackson County, N. C., for the purpose of paying one-third of the cost of paving either side of Main Street to that portion paved by the State Highway Commission, the Local Assessments levied amount to the sum of \$6426.34, the same being necessary expenses for the Town of Sylva; to-wit: for the purpose of paying one-third of the cost of paving the Streets of the Town of Sylva for its citizens.

Section 2. That the assessments have been made and are on file in the Office of the Secretary and Treasurer and Clerk to the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Sylva, and the assessments levied are payable in four years, one-fourth each year, the installments bearing Six Per Cent interest from and after the first publication of this ordinance.

Section 3. That the following matters are hereby determined and declared pursuant to the requirements of sections 2518 to 2560 inclusive of the Municipal Finance Act of the Extra Session, 1921, and the Acts Amendatory to said sections:

(a) A statement of the indebtedness of the Town of Sylva has been made and filed with the Town Clerk pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act and is open to public inspection.

(b) The assessed, valuation of property subject to taxation by the Town of Sylva for the three fiscal years in which the taxes were last levied, as shown by the said statement, is \$1,713,751.00.

(c) The amount of the net debt of the Town of Sylva on the 31st day of December, 1922, is as follows: 1914, Court House bonds \$15,000.00; 1919, Water System Bonds \$25,000.00; 1919, Water System Bonds \$75,000.00; 1922, Local Improvement Bonds \$1,000,000.00, total for bonds \$1,115,000.00, amounts due banks in the form of notes \$250,000.00, total indebtedness \$1,365,000.00, less uncollected local taxes \$700,000.00, the sum of \$665,000.00.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall be published once a week for four successive weeks after its final passage, as required by the Municipal Finance Act, and the Acts Amendatory thereto.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect after its first publication. The assessments hereby levied is for a public necessity; to-wit: for paying one-third of the cost of paving either side of Main Street in the Town of Sylva.

The foregoing Ordinance was passed on the 3 day of July, 1923, and was first published on the 10 day of August, 1923.

Any action or proceedings questioning the validity of said Ordinance must be commenced within Thirty Days after its first publication.

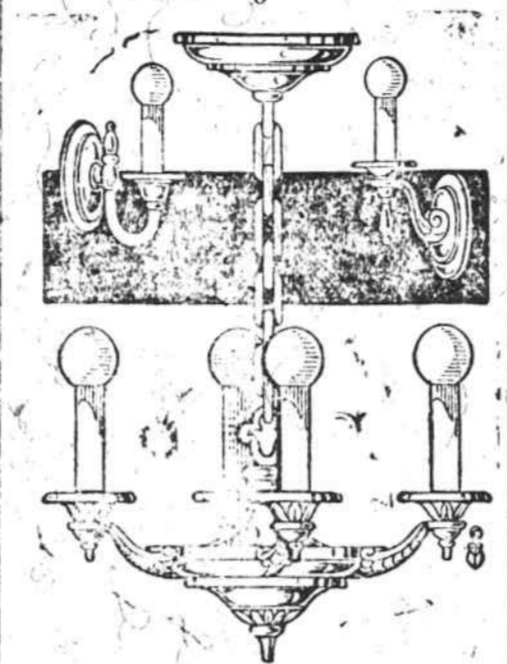
