SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Jesus Asserts His Kingship.
Lesson for May 14th. Mark 11:1-13.
Golden Text: Zechariah 9:9.

When Jesus entered Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday long ago, He gave His approval, for the first time, to a public recognition of His claim to be the long anticipated Messianic King. For Him it was the day of public decision. The secrecy He had hitherto insisted upon was now cast aside. We observe the Master determined to make a public stand, and then to accept the cruel fate His enemies were preparing for Him.

So we watch Him riding as a King, openly hailed as such, into the very heart of His people, challenging friend and foe alike in the venerable metropolis so dear to Him. It is a day of triumph. But when we consider what followed, remembering that the acclaim of Sunday ended in the shame of Friday, the word "decision" seems preferable to the word "triumph." Certainly it was a day of decision for Him. He enters the capital city in the manner of a public confession. He accepts the plaudits of the multitude, His time has come.

But it was also a day of decision for His friends and enemies. The former in their more thoughtful moments, were asking such questions as these: "What shall I do with this King, Who is openly challenging His foes? How shall I follow Him? How can I be of help to Him?" And His enemies the fanatical Zealots, the conservative Herodians, the reactionary Sadducees and Pharisees, all were thinking of how they might best crush this strange King.

On the day following Jesus' entry an event took place that shaped directly into the hands of His foes. He entered the temple, and, in protest against the fraudulent, unholy traffic there taking place in the sale of animals and the exchange of money, drove out, with a whip of cords, the merchants and money-changers, upsetting their booths, and rebuking their desecration of the sanctuary. This bold act of denunciation sharpened the antagonism to the Master, thereby hastening the dramatic catastrophe of His crucifixion.

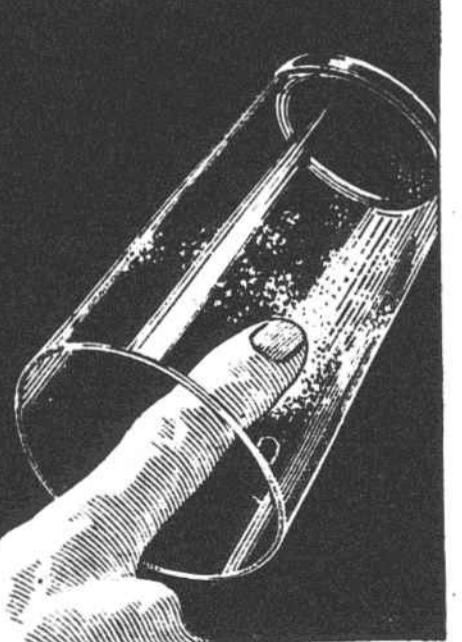

Following is a report of services by the Sylva Rotary Club from July 1, 1932 to March 31, 1933:

Hospital: C. J. Harris Community a non-profit community hospital cooperating with the Duke Foundation; during recent months greatly in need of support from community agencies. Rotary Club's contribution: By monthly contributions total \$90.00. By special contribution (in co-operation with Sylva Junior club) \$100.00. (Note: \$5.00 monthly pledged from April to July.)

Farm Boys' 4-H Club Work. The Rotary club began a program of backing the Farm Boys' 4-H Club Work in the spring of 1932. This work was to embrace the following types of assistance: (1) distributing packaged pigs among worthy farm boys; (2) distributing certified seed corn among farm boys. This work has been continued and will be continued for a period of three years.

As a result of this interest that the Rotary Club took: (1) Two boys now have brood sows from which 4 pigs are being distributed to four other boys; (2) seed corn from corn furnished boys last season is being distributed among 8 other boys.
