Cowan, Mason, McKee Nominated; Ledbetter For House

Cowan, with a total vote of 1,029, was re-nominated for chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. He received 1,029 votes, over Jimmy Craft and received the greatest vote of any candidate in the county. Craft received 786.

C. C. Mason defeated E. L. Wilson for sheriff. The vote was 1,211 for Mason and 1,029 for Wilson.

E. L. McKee, the only woman ever at in the North Carolina legislature, defeated Adam Moses by a vote of 1,029 to 786.

Representative T. C. Bryson was elected for a seat in the House by a vote of 1,029 to 786.

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Hoey Leads In State 2nd Primary Looms

With the official tabulation of votes in the Democratic primary of last Saturday complete, Clyde R. Hoey, Shelby attorney and veteran democratic leader, has a lead of 4,484 over Dr. Ralph McDonald, for Governor; and a second primary will be held on July 4. Hoey carried 50 of the 100 counties, and received 193,935 votes, to 189,451 for McDonald, and 126,650 for Lieutenant Governor A. H. Graham, John A. McKee got 6,837. Jackson county gave Graham 1453; Hoey 1389; and McDonald 450.

Senator Bailey, received a majority of 25,000 over his three opponents, Richard T. Fountain, William H. Griffin, and David L. Strain, with Fountain as runner-up trailing the Senator by 62,000. There will be no second primary here.

With only a few thousand votes difference between W. P. Horton, Paul Grady, and George McNeill, a second primary between Grady, the leader, and Horton, close runner-up; a second primary for Lieutenant Governor was assured.

Charles M. Johnson, State Treasurer, defeated Mrs. Helen Robertson Wold, to retain his post.

W. Kerr Scott defeated William A. Graham, Commissioner of Agriculture by around 10,000 votes.

George Ross Pou was high man among four candidates for State Auditor, but was far short of a majority over the incumbent, Baxter Durham, and a run-off will probably be held.

Stacy Wade, Secretary of State, holds a lead over Thad Egan, but Mike Dunnagan got enough to cause a second primary.

The tremendous Hoey and Graham vote in the mountain counties was expected. Dr. McDonald from the lowlands, leader in the gubernatorial race, and without the big vote he received in the mountains, Hoey would have been in second place behind McDonald.

Payment To Active Trade

The campaign for the payment of compensation to the veterans of the great war comes to an end next week, when bonds, bearing a five percent interest will be issued to each veteran, in exchange for his compensation certificates.

The bonds will be issued in denominations of fifty dollars. All payments over fifty dollars will be made by check, as will all odd money between the fifty dollar figures.

Veterans who have borrowed on their certificates will be charged no interest after October 31, 1931.

The bonds can either be held by the veteran or converted into cash, either in part or in whole.

The method of converting the bonds into cash is for each veteran to take cash of them as he wishes, to cash to his own postoffice, where he will get them certified. The postmaster then gives him a receipt for them and sends them, at the expense of the government, to the postmaster at Asheville, who issues a check and mails a check direct to the veteran.

Or the veteran can take his bonds to his bank and have them sent to the United States Treasury and a check will be issued for the amount of the bonds. In this event, the veteran will pay the expenses.

The bonds will be sent to each veteran by registered mail, and no one except the veteran himself can receive them. Every veteran must call at his own postoffice in person, and receive his bonds. If he is unknown to the postmaster, he must bring at least one responsible person, whose name is the postmaster, to the postoffice. Veterans who live on Rural Free Delivery routes will receive their bonds from their carriers. They cannot go to their post offices and receive their bonds. Those who regularly receive their mail at the post office, and those who live on the star routes must go to the post office in person. All veterans who are unable to write must be accompanied by two responsible witnesses, who can write.

Postmaster Charles N. Price states that the greater part of the bonds for local veterans are expected to arrive in Sylva on June 17, and that it will be at least 21 hours after their arrival before they can be delivered, because a record of each package will have to be made before delivery, which will entail a great deal of work.
