## EXPERIMENT STATION BULLETIN.

### Summary of Contents for the Press.

Bulletin No. 58, of the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station, Dr. H. B. Battle, Director, has been received. Among the contents we notice a continuation of a former article describing the field experiments now in operation in nineteen counties of the State. Details are given showing the size of plots experimented on, the kinds and amounts of fertilizing ingredients used and the exact cost and analysis of the various applications. The result of these experiments will be looked for with much interest.

A meteorological summary for the whole State for the month as well as a table showing the state of the weather at various places from co-operating observers are given by Mr. H. McP. Baldwin, meteorologist. The importance of good drinking waters, the value and need of analyzing the waters in use, the interpretation of chemical analyses, as well as a table showing the result of examination of various drinking water in the State, made by the Experiment Station in the last few weeks are given by Mr. R. G. Grissom, Assistant Chemist.

All those interested in the Experiment Station will be pleased to learn that in addition to the new work with cattle and dairy interests, other investigations will shortly be commenced which we are sure will be acceptable to our people. These additional investigations will be possible by reason of the Stations receiving the benefit of the Hatch Funds from the U. S. and will embrace Botanical and Entomological investigations under the charge of experienced specialists. The Botanical work will include the examination of seeds on sale in the State, for it should be the duty of the Station to protect the farmers against adulterated seeds as well as adulterated fertilizers, for it will be easily seen that one can be practised as well as the other if care is not taken to prevent it.

A similar work is announced in connection with injurious insects and their ravages, with remedies for their prevention. Also identification of these insects when sent to the Station, and publication in the bulletins of their habits and growth. Publications of the Station will be sent to those desiring them.
