# Gay official could win post

WASHINGTON — President Clinton is poised to nominate Roberta Achtenberg, a gay San Francisco offi-cial, to be assistant secretary for fair housing and equal opportunity, government officials said Wednesday.

If she is confirmed, she will be the

highest-ranking executive branch of-ficial in history who is an acknowl-

edged homosexual.

"She is the intended nominee." one government official said, speaking on

condition of anonymity.

White House Press Secretary Dee
Dee Myers said she could not confirm the report, but said Clinton thinks highly of Achtenberg. "I can't comment on that until an announcement

might be ready," Myers said.

But a White House source, who asked not to be identified, said Achtenberg "is slated for that post, yes." The source cautioned that the

In 1990, Achtenberg was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, which functions as the city council. Achtenberg, 42, spent more than 15 years as a lawyer and executive of gay-

years as a lawyer and executive of gay-rights advocacy groups.

She lives with her partner, Mary Morgan, presiding judge of the San Francisco Municipal Court. They have a 7-year-old son but will not say which of them is the biological mother.

In 1989, Achtenberg legally repre-sented a lesbian couple, Millie Jensen and Sue Pavlik, who won the right to adopt a 2-year-old boy with AIDS. Achtenberg accused Alameda County adoption workers of foot dragging in adoption workers of foot dragging in

Achtenberg is not expected to face trouble there. She would have to be approved by the Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs committees, where she has the backing of Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif. New York. Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, the ranking Republican, is not expected to oppose the appointment

However, Achtenberg may face trouble from housing public interest groups. Representatives of several of groups met last week with Hous-ing Secretary Henry Cisneros and voiced concern about what they said was Achtenberg's lack of experience in fair housing law, according to The Washington Blade, a gay weekly.

### Frat members charged with assault

RALEIGH — Members of a fraternity at St. Augustine's College sexually assaulted a woman last fall during a membership ritual, according to the woman's testimony in court.

The student said she told administra-

tion officials about the hazing and assault but went to police two weeks later when it became apparent that "every-body on campus wanted to keep it quiet." Five members of Alpha Phi Alpha

fraternity and two women have been charged with hazing. Three of the men were charged with assault on a female.

Court testimony revealed that the young woman and 13 other women were going through initiation ceremonies to become "sweethearts" when they were all hazed on Oct. 28. The women were blindfolded and led into different rooms where they were teased, touched

other University guests.
Food costs were estimated at \$110,000, with players and coaches receiving \$47.50 per day.

In addition to the travel, food and odging costs, the athletic department also paid for "award" items for each UNC player. All players received a UNC player. All players received a UNC-bought commemorative jersey, which cost \$17 each, a Peach Bowl ring, at a cost of \$135 each and a Starter

brand Peach Bowl parka. NCAA regulations allow for a maximum \$300 per player expenditure for "awards," Lohse said.

Players also received special memorabilia from the Peach Bowl, including a watch commemorating the 25th anniversary of the bowl game.




