



### **Will the Bambino Curse Finally End? Red Sox Vow To Honor Descendants**

BOSTON - The Red Sox will present World Series mementos to descendants of their 1918 championship team, resolving a snub that some claim has put a 75-year-old curse on Boston.

The 1918 squad, the last Red Sox team to win a World Series, was denied com-memorative championship emblems apparently because of a labor-management dispute that included a short players' strike before the fifth game of the World Series. Members of that team, and their de-

scendants, have sought the emblems for decades. The team had 20 players, includ-ing Babe Ruth, on its World Series roster.

Descendants will be presented with framed stickpins during a pre-game cer-emony on Sept. 4. Julia Ruth Stevens, the daughter of Babe Ruth, is expected to be among these attendies

among those attending. "The current Red Sox ownership be-lieves that it is inappropriate for the 1918 Red Sox to be the only World Series championship team not to have received an award for their accomplishment," Dick Bresciani, Red Sox vice president for public relations, said Thursday.

#### New No. 1 Courier Draws **Favorable U.S. Open Path**

NEW YORK - Top-seeded Jim Cou-rier drew a far easier path Thursday for next week's U.S. Open than No. 2 Pete Sampras and two-time defending cham-

pion Stefan Edberg. Courier, seeking his first U.S. Open title starts off against Marco Aurelio Gorriz of Spain, with the winner advancing to play a qualifier. The only real threat to Courier before the quarters could come from unseeded but still dangerous MaliVai Washington.

Sampras, the Wimbledon champion, 1990 U.S. Open winner and runner-up last year, faces the possibility of a tough match against No. 16 Andre Agassi in the round of 16 of 16.

Edberg, No. 3, and Michael Stich, No. 6, are in the bottom half of the draw with Sampras and Agassi. Steffi Graf, the women's No. 1 seed and

two-time champion, should breeze through the early rounds as usual. But she, too, may find trouble in the round of 16 with a potential match against No. 13 Mary Pierce, one of the hardest sluggers on the

If Graf gets by Pierce and goes on to the semifinals, she could find herself once more facing Jana Novotna, who nearly upset her in the Wimbledon final.

Perhaps the most intriguing quarterfinal, though, could be No. 3 Martina Navratilova against No. 7 Jennifer Capriati. Navratilova has been playing well and would like nothing more than to cap her career with another U.S. Open title. Capriati is just as eager to claim her first Grand Slam victors
