UNC Fencing Breaks Even In Rutgers Tournament

UNC's fencing squad traveled north this weekend to open up its regular season at Rutgers, with both the men's and women's squads coming away with 2-2 records.

The men picked up victories over home-standing Rutgers, 15-12, and City College of New York, 25-2, but fell to New York University, 15-11, and preseason-No. 1 Penn State, 22-5.

Kevin Bruen, a third-place finisher at Penn State, was UNC's standout among the foil team, posting an 8-2 mark this weekend.

The women's foil squad defeated NYU, 10-6, and CCNY, 12-4, but failed to score against Penn State.

North Carolina managed to deadlock Rutgers at eight apiece, but the Scarlet Knights were awarded the victory after being awarded the most touches in the match.

The women's epee team fared better, finishing the day at 2-0 with victories over Rutgers and NYU.

Cybil Barret finished the event with a 5-1 record.

UVa. Blanks Cocks to Win NCAA Men's Soccer Title

DAVIDSON — Virginia won an unprecedented third consecutive NCAA men's soccer championship Sunday when Nate Friends scored late in each half for a 2-0 victory over South Carolina.

Friends, who missed the first seven games of the regular season, produced all the Cavalier scoring in the two rounds.

He scored three goals in the 3-1 victory over Princeton in the semifinals of the tournament.

In getting the title, the Cavaliers (22-3-0) won their ninth straight game.

South Carolina (16-4-4) had a 14-game unbeaten streak snapped as it was looking for the school's first NCAA title in any sport.

In addition to its three national titles in a row, Virginia and Santa Clara played to a 1-1 tie in the 1989 championship game and shared the crown.

the swing of things, even the upperclassmen, and that's disappointing," he said. "I think people were thinking too much and not playing instinctively. I think now people are playing more instinctively, and we're playing better."

Montruss' instincts say: Stay in the paint and dominate. Use your size to your advantage. Shoot the high-percentage shot. Rebound.

On each night, Montruss listened. Friday, he heard that part about rebounding a little clearer, swiping 15 boards off the glass.

"I was especially impressed with Montruss' rebounding," Smith said. "Eric and his teammates did a great job on Dare."

Friday's 87-62 win against GW was Montruss' first test against another player his size. Dare, a sophomore from Nigeria, has drawn comparisons to other African centers like Hakeem Olajuwon and Dikembe Mutombo at similar stages of their careers.

But Montruss handled Dare on the post, holding the sophomore to 12 points, many of which were scored after the outcome had been decided. And Montruss' presence

ence undoubtedly helped the Tar Heels draw 31 fouls on the night. UNC was whistled just 13 times.

"I could tell they were a little bit tight out there," Smith said of the big men matchup. "Both of them were trying too hard early in the game."

That fouling trend held true against BYU Saturday.

Montruss, on his way to a 17-point, nine-rebound performance, was one of the men drawing the 34 Cougar fouls on the night. Two of BYU's big men — Russell Larson and Mark Durrant — fouled out, while three other Cougars picked up four fouls.

But the Tar Heels were 47-for-91 in the two games from the charity stripe. Wonder why?

"Me too, I'm wondering, too," Montruss said. "The free throws are something we really can't worry about right now. I'm convinced it's just a mental thing. Everybody's going to the line and thinking about how we're struggling there right now and putting that much more pressure on ourselves to make their free throws."

"We've just got to put it out of our heads and go up there relaxed. The more we play, I don't think it's something we'll have a problem with."

Sampson played just 16 minutes and scored only nine points, but that was enough to impress Agronin.

"She's unbelievable," he said. "She could play on a lot of men's teams — and do well. She's an All-American."

Charlotte Smith, who scored 14 points and grabbed eight rebounds, walked away with tournament MVP honors. She was joined on the all-tournament team by guard Marlon Jones, who scored 20 points and had 8 steals in the title game. Backup center Carrie McKee also reached double figures against Niagara, as she scored a career-high 14 points.

UNC also started strong Friday against Maryland-Baltimore County. UMBC actually scored first to lead 2-0.

Then, Sampson took over. A trey, a rebound layup, a jumper from the left wing, another 3-pointer and a steal leading to a Jill Suddreth layup put UNC up 12-2.

The Tar Heels stretched the lead to 44-17 at halftime and led by as many as 59 points. Sampson and Crawley scored 17 points apiece, and Lawrence and freshman Lori Gear each contributed 9 points. UNC held UMBC to 29 percent from the

down the road as we play other people what we do best."

UNC turned up the defensive pressure in the second stanza, pushing its lead to 57-39 after a Reese 3-pointer. And when BYU's tallest player — 6-10 center Russell Larson — fouled out with 10:15 left, the Tar Heels went to town inside.

Wallace slammed home an alley-oop from Stackhouse, then Dante Calabria fed Stackhouse for another dunk. UNC now had 10 points off 15 BYU turnovers. The Cougars called timeout.

But they didn't grow in the huddle. North Carolina scored inside on four consecutive possessions, then Calabria fed Stackhouse for (you guessed it) a dunk, pushing the lead to 73-48. Smith cleared the bench and the reserves extended the rout, punctuating it with a Pearce Landry NBA trey as time ran out.

"You can't get too down on a game like this," BYU head coach Roger Reid said. "A lot of teams are going to lose to this basketball team this year."

Against GW, cold-shooting UNC fell behind 10-3 before rallying behind its defense to take a 32-28 halftime lead.

"Our defense was really clicking in the first half," said Stackhouse, who led the team in scoring with 19. "It was our best defensive half of the year."

Montruss was able to contain 7-1 Colonial center Yinka Dare, while Calabria sparked UNC off the bench with 17 points. Phelps added 12 points and six rebounds.

"I would have liked Derrick to make the All-Tournament Team," Smith said. "He did everything for us both nights."

America Tonya) Sampson with three, and that kept her out of the game."

When a team goes to this kind of pressure with some double-teaming, there will be an increase in fouls because of body contact or attempted shot or pass blocks.

The Tar Heels committed 40 fouls on the weekend, putting their opponents on the charity stripe often.

Niagara scored 24 of their 58 points from the free throw line, including 16 at the half.

"This defense is not perfect ... yet. But Hatchell isn't worried — North Carolina is talented and deep."

"With the depth we have on our team, we have some fouls to give," Hatchell said. "We're going to get smarter as we play as when to reach and when not to body up and trying to block shots."

Since Hatchell has been using an 11-player rotation, foul trouble shouldn't be a major worry.

Sampson and Sylvia Crawley, who together averaged over 30 points a game last year, saw considerable bench time in the Niagara game due to early fouls. But the Tar Heels still rolled.

The test of how deep this team really is and how effective the new defense will be come in January when UNC plays some decent caliber opponents. The Tar Heels have a few more non-conference tune-ups before they get into the meat of the ACC schedule.

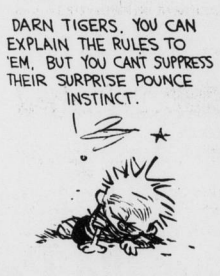
