The new depot will be opened for trains tomorrow. Don't forget it.

Mr. Jno. Devereux Sr., who has been quite sick, is improving.

The week closes in a most quiet manner.

Already new machinery has been ordered for the phosphate mills in place of that destroyed by fire.

It is estimated that the Caraleigh company will receive about \$18,000 in the way of insurance.

A meeting of the centennial committee of arrangements is in progress this afternoon.

Mrs. J. W. Maroon, who has been on an extended visit to friends in Richmond, has returned to her home in the city.

The receipts of cotton in this city, for the week ending August 19th were 130 bales, against 191 for the corresponding week last year. The receipts up to date were 27,827 bales against 40,100 for last season.

We are informed by those who are in connection to know that the outlook for cotton is most promising, and it is more than probable that the prices will be in advance of the present season, so that, even if the crops should be a little short, the returns will be fair. This is good news, and, if it turns out all right, it will go far to dispel the gloom that has been so long prevalent.

THE MURDERER OF SWAIM CONFESSES.

A Horrible Deed Brought to Light.

The Workman of yesterday afternoon says: Charles Reynolds, one of the parties under arrest for the murder of old man Swaim, early yesterday confessed to Sheriff Cook that he shot Solathiel Swaim and that his cousin, Julius Reynolds, planned and instigated the crime.

The sheriff went down to the Pleasant Garden neighborhood on yesterday afternoon in search for J. Reynolds and to obtain further evidence as to the crime.

A search was made in the woods for the coat, which was taken from the old gentleman at the time he was killed. They found where a coat had been burned and upon examination some papers were found, which had failed to burn and which proved to be tax receipts which Sheriff Cook had given the deceased.

Julius Reynolds was arrested last night at the house of a woman of ill repute and was brought to this place this morning at three o'clock and lodged in jail. This morning at 11 o'clock the prisoner was taken before Esquire Eckel for a preliminary hearing, and upon motion of the State the case was continued until Monday next.

On yesterday we stated that Charles Reynolds told Sheriff Cook where to find the money and pistol, which was a mistake. The sheriff discovered the fact by his energy in attempting to ferret out the crime and found the articles while searching the house of Reynolds's father. The sheriff is to be congratulated on his success and that these miserable wretches are now in the clutches of the law.
