A Trim Rig Suspender frocks are in again. A pleated skirt from last year used with a tuck-in blouse of off-white makes a very trim rig when suspenders of the skirt's silk climb the shoulder of the blouse and cross in the back.

Reams could be written about the addition of a bow here and there. Obvious bows are never quite so good as when they are merely ends of collars or cuffs and tie naturally.
