Lovely Fabrics, New Tones Offered for The Bridal Costume This Year

SPRING days make the June bride's fancy seriously turn to thoughts of her wedding gown. She has dreamed so long of that day of days, that it is likely that she knows exactly the kind of wedding dress she wants. If she doesn't have her mind made up, it may be a delightful but difficult task to decide. For there are such lovely fabrics, such gracious styles and such diversity in fashions that it takes serious consideration to make a decision. Wedding gowns this season may be classic satin, chiffon, lace, moire, flat crepe, mousseline de soie, batiste or even organdie. It all depends on whether her wedding is formal or informal, at home, in the garden or the church.

New Tones

Off-white tones are a little newer for bridal gowns than dead white. Off-white also blends beautifully with the pastel colored frocks of the bridesmaids. It may be a creamish shade, pinkish or even a real egg-shell off-white.

Most wedding gowns have some type of molded silhouette. Perhaps a real princess gown may be becoming. It certainly is stylish. Or, the bride may choose to have her wedding gown slightly fitted to the body, with manipulation, tiers, panels or ruffles making an intricate thing of the skirt.

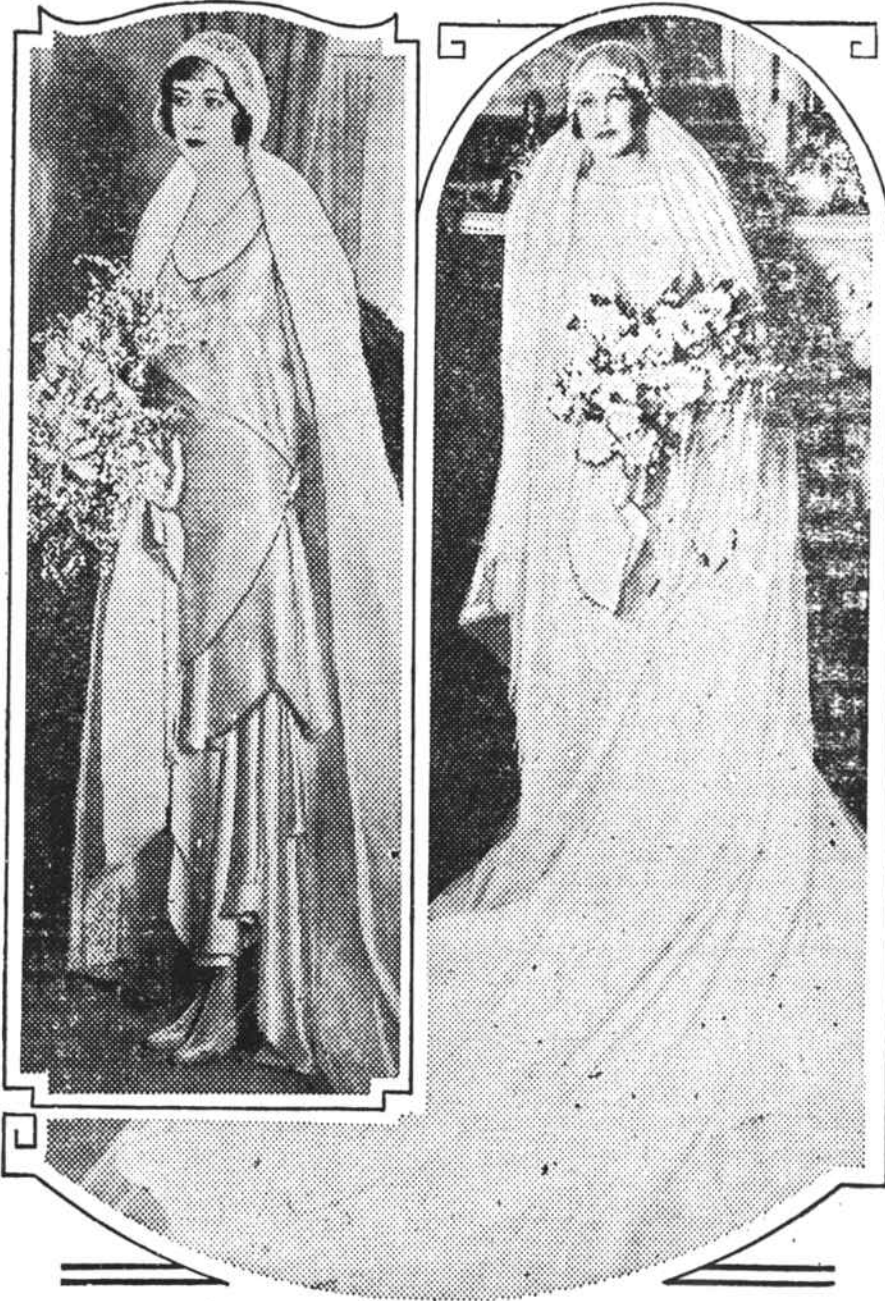
Sleeves are in again, though they may be long and tight or elbow length, the type of sleeve that no modish woman has favored for a couple of decades.

Trains are especially good this year, with cute little side trains dipping unevenly on the more informal frocks and real long court trains trailing their regal beauty behind the formal gowns that will adorn church weddings.

Necklines Vary

Necklines should suit the bride's face. The shallow but wide cut is very good. Round necks have a way of giving a modest look to the bride. Square necklines should be wide but quite shallow in front and back both.

Lace finds a place in many bridal gowns this year. One beautiful gown has a pointed lace yoke that drops over to form cap sleeves to the long satin sleeves. Another chiffon gown has lace round yoke, deep cuffs and a

flounce under the lower tier of chiffon.

The bride who inherits her mother's or grandmother's wedding veil is a lucky girl. For nothing enhances a wedding gown's beauty more than a rich, luxurious old lace veil. Tulle can be used in place of lace. All wedding veils should come to the skirt's end in the back. The cape veil is good but even this dips in the back to trail on the floor.

Charming Caps

The season presents some charming versions of caps to hold wedding veils. The little Dutch cap of lace or pearls is very sweet when the veil flows out from under it in profusion.

Two wedding outfits are shown today which are quite

different. One is off-white satin, from Frances Clyne, made with unusual circular cut to the skirt which gives the impression of three tiers, the left side and back trailing in regal beauty. The neck is round, the sleeves long and rather simple, with mitt cuffs. A single ornament of pearls catches the side of the skirt's drape. The lace veil makes its own cap, caught with orange blossoms at both sides.

The other wedding gown is very new, a princess gown of fine double chiffon, made long enough to touch the floor all around. It has a bateau neck and its sleeves are tight to the elbow, but open and flow clear to the floor. The veil falls from a net cap, edged in pearls.
