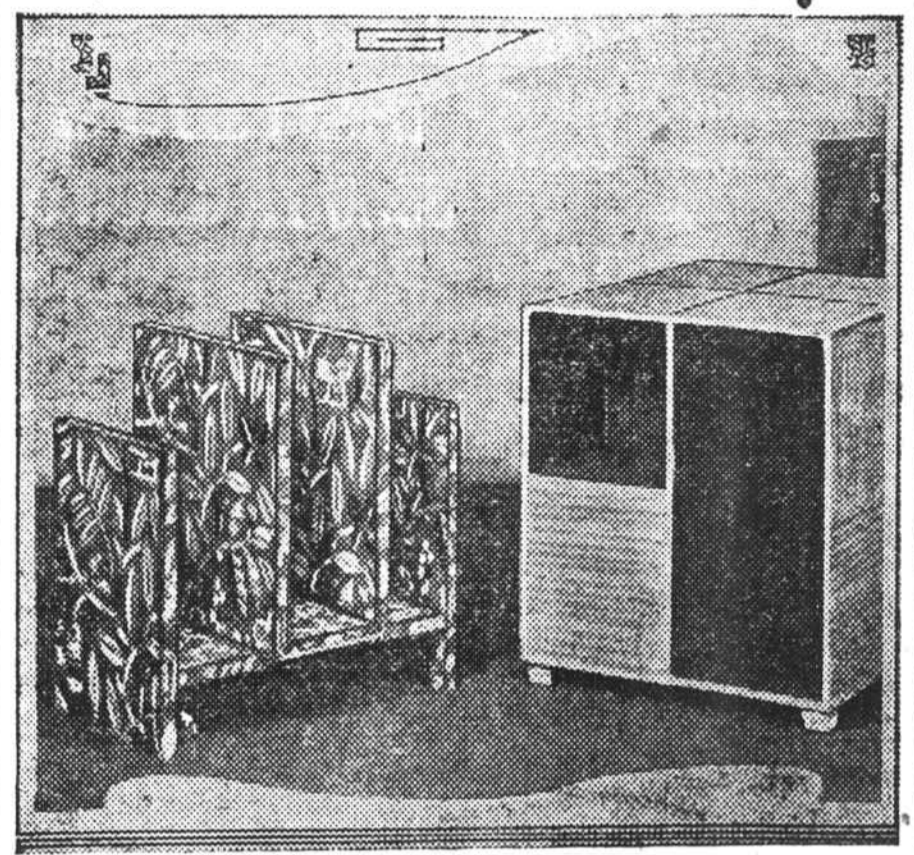
HONORS MOTHER
