Look For Huge

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.-President Roosevelt's action in the devaluation of the dollar of 41 per cent is understood by Wall street to have restored international credit and to have opened the way for a huge credit expansion. It is believed that the stabilization of the dollar has been largely accomplished. How the expansion work will be created depends on the move the treasury uses the increase in the gold supply and on the pace of business men in credit expansion. Bankers say there must be confidence. As bank credit expands bank deposits will increase and there will be an increase in commodity prices and will be reflected on real estate and securities. How the treasury will use the two billion dollars in gold remains to be seen.



The \$950,000,000 appropriation for bills passed, one continuing seed loans to farmers for another year a basic commodity under the agricultural administration act, were of especial interest to the North Carolina delegation.

The seed loan bill was introduced by Representative Lindsay C. Warren, who, together with Senator Smith of South Carolina, has sponsored the measure for the past three years. Both Representatives Warren and John H. Kerr of the Second District, spoke in advocacy of the bill which differed in two important particulars from the measure passed by the Senate last week.
