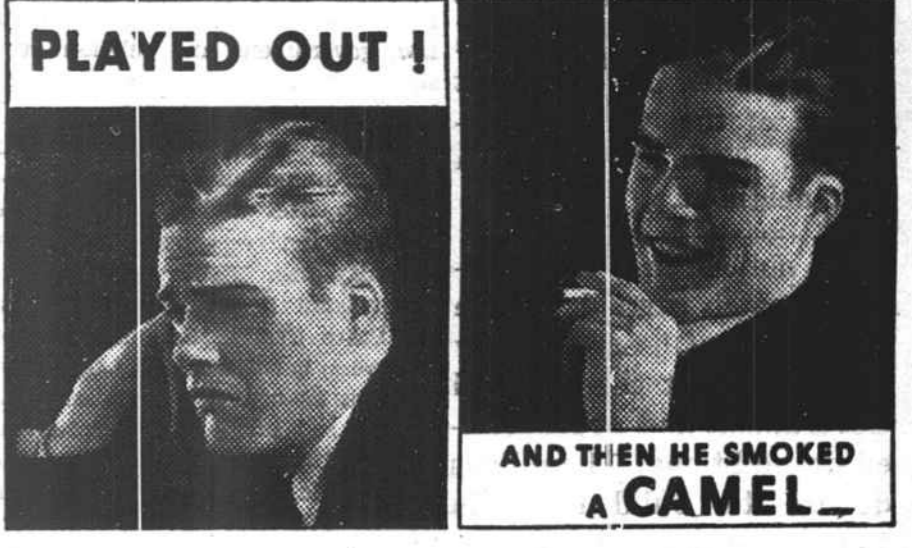
After the cutting of the bride's cake, which afforded much merriment, a tempting ice course, carrying out the color scheme of pink and white, was served to the following guests:
