Last week information was given in this column on the food outlook for 1962. This week, you have a summary of the outlook for housing and house furnishing for 1962.

HOUSING

Situation:
Residential construction has contributed greatly to the business recovery begun in March 1961. Private housing starts were at an annual rate of slightly less than 1.4 million in September 1961, and farm housing starts were higher for each month, April through August 1961, than in the corresponding months of 1960. Housing prices increased 0.4% during 1961.

Outlook
The building trade predicts 1.4 million housing units to be built in 1962, a 5% increase over 1961. The Housing Act of 1961 has made loans easier for low and medium low income families through the Federal Housing Administration and the Farmers Home Administration. Easier loans coupled with an expected 9% increase in net farm income in 1961 and the same in 1962 offer unprecedented opportunity for rural housing improvement in 1962.

HOUSE FURNISHINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Situation
Furniture prices remained rather steady during the past year. Slight increases were seen in some areas due to the increase in labor. The retail sales were lower during the first seven month period. During the later part of the year a recovery was made and the sales were greater than the same period of the previous

year. Appliance prices have declined uninterruptedly since mid-1951 and are now 2.4 per cent lower than in September, 1960, due partly to the influence of discount houses. Price cutting started at the manufacturers level; retailers have been quick to pass on the savings. Stocks are ample and competition is still rugged.

Outlook
Present supply in furniture is expected to improve. Lumber and textile costs are creeping up and this is expected to influence furniture prices during the next year. 1962 may bring a halt to price decline in electrical appliances. Five manufacturers have announced price increases ranging from 3 to 5 per cent to their distributors. They attribute the increase to the rising cost of materials and labor. Whether the distributor passes on this increase to the consumer will depend on demand. In summary, most indications seem to justify a fairly optimistic view of 1962. Although the trend in prices, in general, will likely continue upward, the rate of increase is expected to be moderate and supplies of goods and services will be quite adequate.
