A John Graham High School graduate, now a sophomore at Chowan College in Murfreesboro, is planning a career in folk music, according to a recent feature story in The Virginia-Pilot of Norfolk, Va. Willie Norwood of Arcola and his comrade, Jack Armstrong of Norfolk, Va., are seriously considering the idea of recording folk music.
