Reports
TO THE PEOPLE



WASHINGTON, D. C. — As the grim situation in the Middle East continues to rapidly change—confronting the world with extremely serious threats to peace everywhere, it is some comfort to recall that all of the high Arab and Israeli leaders I recently saw and talked to expressed a strong desire for peace. This ought to give us some hope.

Anyway, whether peaceful solutions come early or late, I see no present need for American military intervention either in the Arab-Israeli conflict or the civil war in Jordan.

Our recent study mission to the troubled area took us to Lebanon, Kuwait, Bahrain, Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Israel. We met with top leaders in every country. We gave each one a chance to get a load off his chest — to tell us about their problems and their attitudes toward our country.

I might add that each American Embassy sent a representative to our major meetings to report back immediately the key points of each talk to Washington.

I cannot touch on everything discussed, for reasons of both space and security, but I might briefly spotlight some of the major Israeli and Arab positions.

Prime Minister Golda Meir of Israel told us flatly that "Israel has no territorial aspirations," and emphasized that she did not want Israel's children to go through what their fathers went through. "We want peace," she said, and stressed Israel's willingness to withdraw, but said that any such withdrawal must leave Israel with secure borders. Basically, Israel wants borders they can defend if they have to, and the means to defend them.

"The Israelis," Mrs. Meir said, "want the Arabs to realize that the present state of continuous war is bad for both sides—that not only Israel is suffering. The Arabs don't have to love us, but they could at least cooperate with us in rebuilding the shattered cities along the Suez Canal."

Israeli leaders made the point that Egyptian violations of the cease-fire — especially moving new missiles much

closer to the Canal than before — having substantially altered the balance of military strength along the Canal. They contend that if fighting starts up again, Israel will be far more vulnerable than before. Israel, with much less artillery than Egypt depends on fighting planes for close tactical support. However, the new SAM 3 missile sites along the Canal could knock down Israeli planes, thus allowing the Egyptian artillery a freer hand.

Top Arab leaders also expressed strong desires for peace. Dr. Fawzi, Nasser's foreign affairs adviser, told us he could see at least a "glimmer of hope" on the horizon.

From the Arab point of view, the crucial — the most pressing problem — is the question of Palestinian refugees. For example, one of the refugees asked us: "How is it possible for Jews to come back to Palestine after 2,000 years and the Arab refugees cannot return after 22?" Whether the implication of the question is accurate or not, it does tell us how the Arabs feel.

The Arab position is that Israel should withdraw completely from "all occupied territory and then negotiate." However, they definitely feel that Israel still has her eye on more territory. At the same time, the more responsible Arab leaders deny any desire on their part to see Israel "pushed into the sea," but they contend that Israel cannot ultimately prevail against "one hundred million" Arabs, no matter how many wars the Arabs lose.

However, amid all the conflicting claims, our task is to press onward to a responsible political and diplomatic settlement, keeping out of internal domestic problems in individual nations, always keeping a watchful eye on Russia. We should never forget that Communist imperialism is at the root of the whole Middle East problem, just as it is in South Eastern Asia.

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Workshop To Be Held For All Area Ministers

The following letter has been sent to ministers (black and white) in Vance, Warren and Granville Counties whose names and addresses are known. Ministers in the area who did not receive a letter, are asked to please consider this publication an invitation and notify us at the Center if they wish to be added to our mailing list.

Dear Colleagues:
We are ready to continue our joint and mutually planned endeavors "to strengthen the role of the church and the pastor in helping individuals with personal and family problems." So far, we have had an eventful two and one-half years together. Our monthly Tuesday afternoon meetings have explored problems of grief, marital discord, child misbehavior, infidelity, sex guidance of youth, alcoholism, and other common problems brought to the minister. One group of ministers have studied marriage counseling in weekly meetings and worked with actual cases under skilled guidance.

As step #1 for 1970-71, at the request and recommendation of last year's group, we will present again our basic "Relationship Skills Workshops" that you found so helpful. Even "old hands" who have had it before find new insights the second time through.

This workshop explores the role of feelings in relationship problems and focuses on teaching the skills of feeling level communication and of providing emotional support to individuals in extreme anxiety. The incidents studied are drawn from actual experiences of the participants. The workshop itself becomes a personal growth stimulating experience and an exploration of how to put our deepest caring to work. In our previous experience the sessions pass all too quickly because of the high level of group involvement.
