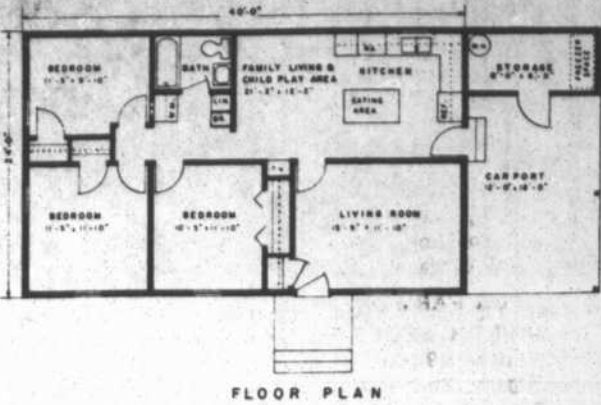

Agriculturally Speaking

Three Bedroom House Offers Comfort, Economy

Comfort at moderate cost is an outstanding feature of a three bedroom house plan available to Warren County citizens through the Agricultural Extension Service.

The plan, Extension house plan No. 90, features 960 square feet of heated space, plus a carport and large storage area. Complete working drawings of the plan can be obtained from the county extension office or by writing to Agricultural Engineering Extension, N. C. State University, Raleigh, N. C. 27607.

Although this is a minimum house, the rooms are large enough for comfortable living. The carport is convenient to the kitchen, the family living and child play area near the kitchen allows the homemaker to keep an eye on her family, even while working and the bedrooms will hold the usual pieces of furniture.

An especially convenient feature of this house is the stor-

age and utility room at the rear of the carport. This room is a step away from the kitchen door and is a good location for the freezer and water heater.

More than 6,000 plans of a similar-style house have been used in North Carolina in the past two years.
