Dig Bulbs When

But don't be too quick to remove this spring left-over. North Carolina State Univer-

sity extension specialists point out that, during the period when foliage is ripening, the bulbs should be left alone. After the foliage had died back, the bulbs may be dug, divided, cured and re-set.

While you're waiting, you might consider planting annual flower seed in the bulb bed. A good one is nasturtium, because if has rather large seed which can be poked into the ground among the foliage of the bulbs.


