## Children Study Card Catalog At Vaughan School

The children in grades three through seven at Vaughan Elementary School studied the use of the card catalog in the library. The card catalog is actually a cabinet filled with drawers. Cards filed in alphabetical order are in the drawers. These cards are an alphabetical guide to the materials in the library. Actually it is a large index similar to the index in the back of a book.
