

Pork Cook-Out **Contest To Be** Held At Fair

Are you interested in showing off your "chefmanship" at North Carolina State Fair while competing for prizes in the North Carolina Pork Cook-Out **Champ Contest?**

Deadline for entering the N. C. Pork Cook-Out Champ Contest, sponsored by the N C. Pork Producers Association with the cooperation of the N. C. Department of Agriculture is Sept. 9. Any male older than 12 and a resident of North Carolina is eligible to participate in the contest. Winners will be selected on the basis of judgment of quality in pork-cut selected imaginative use of pork, excellence of preparation, and appetite appeal.

Contestants must furnish their own meat, fuel, grill and utensils and may enter one or more original recipes. Each recipe must be accompanied by an official entry blank.

From the recipe entries submitted, at least 10 contestants will be selected to compete in the state cook-out Oct. 16 at the N. C. State Fair.

Copies of the Pork Cook-Out entry blanks are available from the Home Economics Extension Agent's Office in the Warren County Agricultural Building. Now is the time to send in your recipe entry. Remember the deadline for entry is Sept. 9, 1977.




