Indian Youths Complete Summer Work Activities

The Summer Youth Demonstration Program, developed by the N. C. Commission of Indian Affairs, and designed to meet the needs of the economically disadvantaged Indian population of North Carolina, came to an end last Friday in Warren County. Through contracts with Lead Regional Organizations and program operators, the Commission obtained a commitment for 23 Warren County youths between the ages of 15-18.

The program provided a meaningful summer work and training experience for the youths. It also expanded the participant's

career options by gearing the work site of each student to meet his or her special interests. A series of eight career planning days, once a week, was held to expose the participants to a variety of careers. The Warren County Health Department visited the Old Haliwa School recently, where the program was held during the summer. Dennis Retzlaf and Mrs. Miranda Earp presented a film on "Health Careers."

One day a week was used for Remedial Education Day. Adult teacher-supervisors worked with the students in the development of personal educational programs.

Recruitment for the program was done by the commission's manpower developer, Herbert Richardson, CETA director. He assigned the enrollees to work sites in the county compatible with their
