be lost in the moving process, so it is better to cut them off now and allow the plant to adjust to the loss before it is moved.

Another timely reminder relates to watering shallowrooted shrubs. Plants such as camellias and azaleas don't put down deep roots. This makes them susceptible to damage during dry weather. Another reason they need water is that they are continuing to develop flower buds at this time.

Don't fertilize these plants with nitrogen now. It's too late for this season. Feeding them nitrogen now would cause a spurt of new growth. This tender vegetable would not have time to harden off by the onset of cold weather, making it highly vulnerable to damage.

Save Water
