Some Change Is Awaiting Deer Hunters

Deer hunters will find some changes in the mandatory big game tagging procedure this season.

'The main change for the 1977-78 deer season will involve the use of the tag and the big game kill report," said a spokesman for the N. C. Wildlife Resources Commission's Division of Game.

This year, the tag must not be removed from the carcass of the animal until it is finally skinned and dressed for consumption. Last year, the tag was removed and attached to the Big Game Kill Report. The Big Game Kill Report must be obtained and completed prior to the final skinning for consumption.

Hunters will also note other differences in the tagging procedure when they purchase their big game licenses this year. This is the first year that the "Hunter's Choice" tags will be in effect for either-sex deer hunting in certain parts of the State. Sportsmen are urged to pay particular attention to the instructions which accompany their tags and big game license.




