

#### Dividend Declared

The Board of Directors of Peoples Bank and Trust Company has declared a regular quarterly dividend of 24 cents per share and an extra year-end dividend of 8 cents per share on the bank's common stock for the fourth quarter.

The 32-cent dividend brings the total dividends paid in 1977 to \$1.02. This represents a 9.2 percent increase in cash dividends paid over 1976 after giving effect to the increase in number of shares outstanding as a result of the 20 percent stock dividend de-

clared in November, 1976. The new dividend is payable Dec. 30, 1977 to shareholders of record on Dec. 21, 1977. The ex-dividend date was set for Dec. 15,

At its regular meeting, the Board of Directors established a new policy of payment of dividends. According to Chairman and President William H. Stanley, the bank has historically paid an extra year-end dividend on its common stock but will alter that practice in 1978.


