

# Judge Allen Presides Over Session Of District Court

Judge C. W. Allen, Jr., of Oxford presided over the September 16 session of Warren County District Court, disposing of the following cases:

Larry Hargrove, unauthorized use of motor vehicle, not guilty.

Bobby Lee Williams, failure to comply, court

found that defendant is in arrears \$1170 and that he is an able-bodied man able to work. He was found in violation of his suspended sentence which was revoked and he was ordered to jail from four to six months.

Charles Edward Williams, driving under the influence of intoxicating

liquor, entered plea of guilty of careless and reckless driving, ordered to jail for five months, suspended for two years on conditions that he pay a fine of \$100 and costs and not be found guilty of alcohol related crime within two years.

James Plummer Reeves, stop sign violation, driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, speeding 81 in 55 mph zone, called and failed, voluntary dismissal with leave.

James L. Hutchinson, six counts of worthless checks, ordered to pay the costs of court in one case.

Charles David Kirby, improper passing, entered plea of no contest to unsafe movement, ordered to pay costs of court and \$15 fine.

James Edward Macklin, bastardy, order to show cause is ordered dismissed.

Lewis Davis, operating a motor vehicle without financial responsibility, displaying fictitious registration plate, ordered to jail for 20 days, suspended for two years upon conditions he pay costs of court and \$35 fine and for two years not be involved in crime involving improper registration or insurance.

Lewis Davis, driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, failure to heed warning light and siren and improper passing, entered plea of guilty of careless and reckless driving after consumption, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for three years on condition that he pay the cost of court in two cases and a fine of \$135, attend the alcohol and drug education traffic school and pay \$100 tuition, and not be found guilty of any crime involving alcohol and reimburse the State of North Carolina for his attorney's fees. A voluntary dismissal was taken on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, speeding 75 in 55 mph zone and speeding 55 in 35 mph zone.

Ronnie Mills, damage to personal property, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for five years on conditions he pay the cost of court and fine of \$100 and pay the sum of \$85 as restitution to Rallie Settler for his 1969 Ford, and for five years not be found guilty of any crime involving alcohol or firearms. He gave notice of appeal to the next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

Ronnie Mills, damage to real property, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for five years on condition that he pay cost

of court and \$100 fine, pay \$34 restitution for the use and benefit of Larry Gupton and for five years not be found guilty of crime involving firearms or alcohol. Defendant gave notice of appeal to next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

Ronnie Mills, discharging firearm into occupied property, court found probable cause as to the guilt of defendant on this felony charge and ordered him bound over to the next criminal session of Superior Court in Warren County.

Jimmy Richardson, damage to real property, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for five years on condition that he pay costs of court and \$100 fine, pay \$34 restitution for the use and benefit of Larry Gupton and for five years not be found guilty of crime involving firearms or alcohol. He gave notice of appeal to next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

Jimmy Richardson, damage to personal property, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for five years on condition he pay the costs of court and \$100 fine, pay \$85 restitution to Rallie Settler and for five years not be found guilty of any crime involving firearms or alcohol. He gave notice of appeal to next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

He gave notice of appeal to next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

Nawathia Mills, discharging firearm into occupied property, court found probable cause as to the guilt of defendant on this felony charge and ordered him bound over to the next criminal session of Warren County Superior Court.

Ella Woods, two counts of failure to comply, called and failed, arrest order issued and bond set at \$200.

Malvin Darnell Talley, second offense of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, entered plea of guilty of first offense of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, ordered to jail for six months, suspended for two years on condition

that he pay cost of court and \$125 fine and surrender his license and not operate a motor vehicle on the highways of N. C. until allowed to do so by the Department of Motor Vehicles, and attend the alcohol and drug education traffic school and pay \$100 tuition.

James Hartford Brown, driving under the influence of drugs, entered plea of guilty of careless and reckless driving after consumption, ordered to jail for five months, suspended for five years on condition he pay fine of \$100 and costs and that he not be found guilty of crime involving alcohol or drugs for five years and that he pay a tuition of \$100 and attend the alcohol and drug education traffic school.

Jacob Wallace Jiggetts, no driver's license, called and failed, arrest order issued and bond set at \$200.

Mildred J. Wright, speeding 83 in 55 mph zone, called and failed, bond ordered forfeited.

Larry Keith Oliver, speeding 67 in 55 mph zone, called and failed.

Roy Keith Floyd, Sr., felonious possession of stolen motor vehicle, voluntary dismissal.

The speaker will be the pastor of the church, the Rev. Julian Mills. Dinner will be served on the grounds.

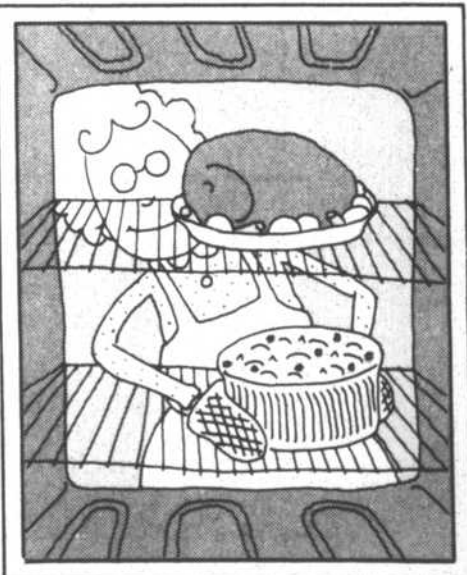
