## Many Suffer Because Of Being Overweight

Are you one of the hundreds of people in Warren County who has a problem with weight? Did you know that obesity greatly contributes to high blood pressure?

Millions of Americans across the United States suffer from hypertension due to excessive weight Most of these Americans have great difficulty in reducing their weight and controlling it once they have lost those extra pounds.

For that reason, anyone who is overweight should find these helpful hints, provided by the Community Hypertension Program, a good guide to reducing and controlling weight:

To lose weight, those eating habits which made you gain weight must be changed. (Fad diets or crash diets do not offer the proper nutrients needed by the body and the weight loss which may occur is rarely ever a permanent weight loss.)

Set a short-term goal for yourself. Slow but steady weight loss of one or two pounds a week is best.

Eat three balanced meals a day, never skip a meal, including breakfast. Eat slowly and really

taste everything you eat. Meat, poultry, and fish should be baked, broiled. roasted or boiled. Eat only the lean part.

Keep busy so you will not be tempted to eat from boredom. Budget your calories in

consideration of special occasions such as banquets, dinner with friends or parties. Plan low-calorie "nibbl-

ers" as part of your diet. Save a food item from a previous meal to use as a snack. Low-calorie "nibblers"

include: Raw vegetables, raw fruit, diet or low-calorie drinks, skim milk, buttermilk. cheese and popcorn with no salt or butter.

Foods high in calories that should be limited in your diet include: fried foods, gravies sauces, added fats (butter), potato chips, nabs, sugar, candy, sweets, cookies, pie, cakes, soft drinks, alcoholic drinks, beer and wine.

Take advantage of daily opportunities to increase activities. Instead of riding, walk whenever possi-


