Proper Pressure Needed In Canning

Do you own a pressure canner with a clock-type gauge? If so, have you had the unit tested for accuracy?

Proper pressure for canning is most important for safe preservation of food, and pressure canner gauges should always be checked each year.

The canner gauges can be checked for accuracy at the home economics extension agent's office in the Warren County Agriculture Building, which is located at 101 South Main Street in

There is no charge for testing canners. Just bring the lid and the procedure will take only a few minutes. If new parts are needed, recommendations will be made.


Now is the time to get your canner tested.
