FARM AND GARDEN.

Practical Points for the Tillers of the Soil.
Plant only the best seed. Feed the soil green food.
Fence little but fence well. Sell freshly killed cattle to the butcher.
Industry, economy and common sense are the best capital.
Do not allow the use of any intoxicating drinks on your farm.
Give your tenderest care to the best products of your farm—your sons and daughters.
Keep your stock carried, stable, cleaned, rubbish picked up, and round-sides and mowing fields free from weeds.
It would be well for farmers to be on the safe side, and save all the corn stalks. They will help out a short hay crop amazingly.
Plenty of rubbing will produce a good coat on your horse. "Elbow grease" opens the pores, softens the skin and promotes the general health.

In fattening turkeys, confine them ten days before they are to be sold, less that time they will gain flesh rapidly, after that time they fall off because of uneasiness and restlessness on account of confinement.
Forest leaves will now begin to fall, and are worth gathering for litter, and to mix with horse-dung for hot-beds, where hot-beds are to be made. They are also useful for covering cabbage-heds, celery pits; also for heating hot-beds etc.
Supply dairies with stable, the chief branches as well as the main stables. Keep ephraim-springs in a growing state by the use of liquid manure, and pitch them into shape. If a black split affects them use tobacco water.
The importance of draining the soil was learned by accident in South Carolina, and has been worth thousands of dollars to the farmers of the State. A thick, dark soil through a newly sown turnip field, and wherever his foot struck there was "a stand" of turnips, and nowhere else for the soil had been loosely sown and the weather dry.

The best eggs are the result of a neat diet. When grasshoppers and worms fall, feed meat meals and butchers' offal. The crushed oyster-shell supply and the boxes of road dust or ashes should be kept within easy reach. The high colored and well flavored eggs of Kansas during the grasshopper visitation were a marvel to strangers.
Vicious habits are early induced in horses by tickling and plugging them, while in the stable, and under no circumstances should be indulged in. Never beat or use harsh language to a horse in the stable. A horse is susceptible of taking in a vast amount of knowledge; he learns quickly; and his education should be of the kind that will make him the safest and most useful.

Large roots weighing ten to sixteen pounds cannot be grown at less than sixteen inches apart, eighteen inches better; with full rows, at this distance, there should be 9,800 roots to the acre, and if they average ten pounds there will be forty-nine tons to the acre. At half the distance, the roots may only average three pounds, making only little more than twenty-nine tons to the acre. This rule applies to corn also, for all plants need abundant feeding space at the roots, and must not be crowded.
For chicken cholera the following is recommended by a physician of standing: Blue mass, sixty grains; camphor, twenty-five grains; cayenne pepper, thirty grains; rhubarb, forty-eight grains; laudanum, sixty drops; made into twenty pills. To the silling, give one every four hours until they act freely; then a teaspoonful of castor oil. To the well, give one pill, followed by the oil. Separate the healthy fowls, renovate the old floors and coops, purifying with lime and carbolic acid. Thoroughly wash the new quarters and sprinkle with cold water, and dust with lime every few days.
A writer in the American Agriculturist says: The farms of this country have a diversity of soils, while climatic influences compel the farmers to conform their crops and methods of cultivation in accordance therewith; but it may be claimed that there is no soil so poor that it cannot be made to yield a profit, provided the tiller uses it to the best advantage. In this country, farmers rely more upon the quality of the soil than upon their own efforts; but in Europe, on the other hand, the farmers always depend upon judicious cultivation and the proper feeding of the soil.
It is plain enough to the enquirer that the dairy man who are the most successful are those who seek to improve their stock. Scrub bulls do not pay. It pays to breed good calves and raise the females for the dairy; better

to sell off the cows when they are dry and substitute others in their place. Pursuing such a system, dairymen would witness an annual improvement on the average with all the farms, that would add many thousands of dollars to the value of their products. Good feeding, pure water, dry quarters, and clean management of the milk and butter are, of course, very necessary; but the most important of all is to keep pure-bred bulls.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Useful Information for Parlor, Fireside and Kitchen.
To keep starch from sticking to ironing the irons with a little piece of wax or sperin.
FRENCH FRENCH CAKE—Four cups flour, four cups sugar, two cups butter, six eggs, one cup milk, two teaspoons baking powder.
SPONGE CAKE—Eight eggs, one pound sugar, one-half pound flour, the grated rind of one lemon or juice of one-half lemon and salt.
ALICE'S CAKE—One cup butter, four cups flour, two cups sugar, one cup milk, two eggs, one-half pound raisins, two teaspoons powder, salt.
APPLE PIES—Shog some rather sour apples and pour boiling water on them. Pour off, when cool, strain; add lump sugar and a little lemon-juice.
GRANDMA'S DOUGHNUTS—Six cups dough, one cup sugar, three or four tablespoons melted lard, one egg, one-half teaspoon of baking powder; salt and cinnamon. After cutting let stand for an hour before frying.
JELLY WATERS—One large teaspoon currant or cranberry jelly, one goblet hot water. Beat up well for fever patient. Wild cherry or blackberry jelly is excellent, prepared the same, for summer complaint.
MACARONI—One pound of sweet almonds blanched and beaten to a paste; mix with them one and a quarter pounds of powdered sugar, the grated rind of two lemons and the whites of six eggs. Drop on buttered paper and bake a light brown in a moderate oven.
BEAN MARMALADE—One package of gelatine soaked for one hour in a pint of water. At the end of this time pour on the gelatine two quart of boiling hot milk; add three heaping table-spoonful of powdered sugar; stir until dissolved; flavor to taste; strain into molds and set in the ice.

DATE PUDDING—Mince half a pound of dates and one-quarter of a pound of suet very fine; add half a pound of finely graded bread crumbs, five ounces of sugar, a pinch of salt and a little grated nutmeg. Mix thoroughly with two well-beaten eggs; pour into a buttered pudding mold and boil for four hours.
APPLE SAUCE—Three eggs, one pint each of milk and apple sauce not sweetened, and one cup of pulverized sugar. Make a boiled custard of the milk, yolks of eggs, and sugar to sweeten, with salt flavoring. Beat the whites of the eggs to a very stiff froth, and beat in the sugar and sauce little by little. Scryp the custard as a sauce.
POTATOES FOR BREAKFAST—A simple and delicate method of preparing potatoes for breakfast is a great favorite in the West Indies. Two pounds of peeled potatoes are washed and grated; four ounces each are added of sugar and butter melted, one teaspoonful each of salt and pepper, well mixed; placed in a baking dish and put into a brick oven until done it shows a delicate brown color.
A POMADE FOR THE HANDS—For a very nice pomade for the hands, scrape off equal quantities of spermaceti and pure beeswax, cover with sweet oil, and simmer until it becomes liquid. In a small china pot, cup or jar; add a few drops of rosewater and mix it with the other ingredients. When well blended, take it from the fire and let it set firm in the cup in which it has been melted. Rub this well into your hands on retiring, and wear a pair of soft kid gloves. In the morning wash them with oatmeal or almond powder, not soap, and you will soon see a manifest improvement in color and texture.
TO PREPARE SEAWEEDS—Wash the seaweed in fresh water, cut the paper to the required size, place it on a plate with fresh water, and spread the plant on the paper with a camel's hair brush, making it look as natural as possible; then raise out of the water and place in a slanting position to let the water run off; put over some blotting paper and place between an old book or between two pieces of cardboard and press well. When dry gum the specimens in a scrap book. To make these specimens retain a fresh appearance brush over them a solution of spirits of turpentine in which a little gum mastic has been dissolved.
