### Pilot News

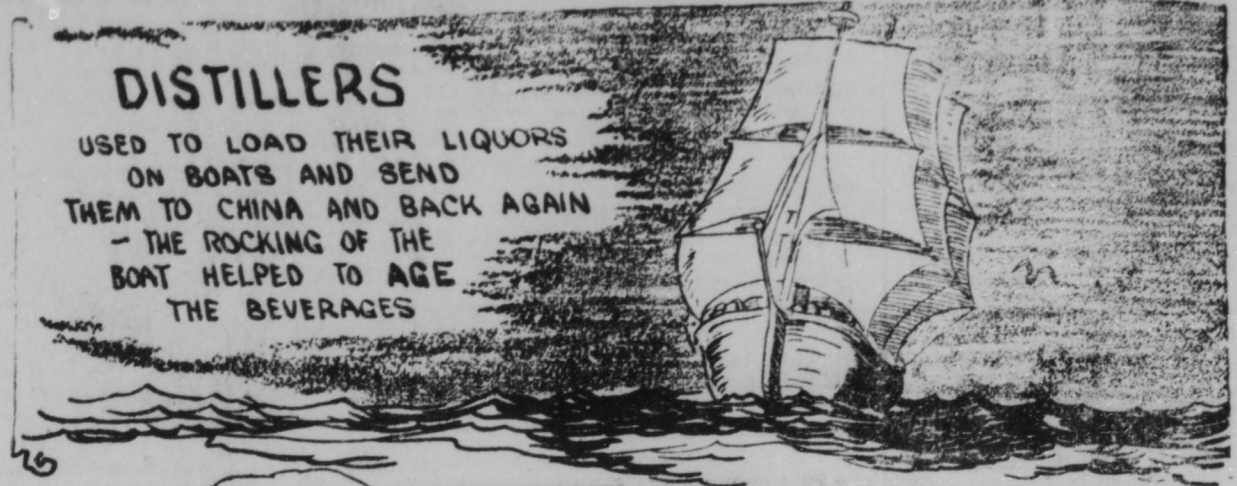
