"Practice safety with your chil-

That was the advice given Tar Heel parents this week by Joe W. Garrett, assistant motor vehicles commissioner.

Garrett pointed out that nowadays parents are urged to take an active interest in the children's games and lessons, to practice their dancing with them, to join them in other activities.

"So why not practice safety with them, too?" he asked.

He proposed that parents make safe practices a habit in the home and more particularly in traffic. It uct. is not always necessary to tell the child to look both ways before crossing the street, he said. The parent who obviously looks both ways is setting an example the child cannot fail to observe.

"Children look up to their parents," he said, "and they take as much pride in imitating the careful parent as they do in imitating the daring and careless one."

Garrett also urged parents not to fear indulging in old-fashioned discipline if such action is neces-

"Your firmness may someday save your child's life," he told par-

Garrett listed five practices for parents to put into effect with their children.

1. Practice and talk safety at home and in traffic until safety becomes second nature with the

2. Absolutely forbid playing in unsafe places. Where safe play places for children do not exist, parents should exert individual TRA Camp to Be Held and civic pressure to have safe play areas provided.

3. Support the school and the police in their efforts to promote child safety.

5. Never permit children to use roller skates, coaster wagons or bicycles without supervision until they have demonstrated their ability to use such articles carefully and safely.

Tobacco Referendum Is Set for July 23

On July 23, some 250,000 fluecured tobacco farmers in North and South Carolina will be given an opportunity to vote in a referendum on continuance for another three years (1956-57-58) of the 10cent per acre assessment to promote export outlets for their prod-

The referendum date was announced today by J. Henry Vaughan of Elm City, Chairman of the Tobacco Associates Board of Directors.

Tobacco Associates, a non-government, non-profit organization, representing all flue-cured interests from the producer to the consumer, has taken the promotion of overseas outlets for the flue-cured crop as its primary goal.

Since its formation eight years ago, an average of 422,600,000 pounds of the flue-cured leaf have been sold annually in the export

"Last year," Vaughan said, "this important portion of the crop brought growers some \$223,000,-000, or an average of \$215 per

Vaughan said the referendum will be held at regular community polling centers and that the usual voting hours would be ob-
