The 35 hawks hanging on the tree or on the ground surrounding the tree have caused many a person traveling along the highway to stop and look.

These hawks were killed by one man, Paul Hall of Troy. He killed with a telescopic sight.

Hall said he killed as many as four in one day, some as far as the Washington Duke Hotel April 300 yards distant.

Hawks had been taking a heavy toll of the poultry in the community before Hall began his raid on the flying prey. The com-
