LOCAL MENTION

Eleven new cases of measles were reported Monday to the county health department. No other cases of any kind were reported to the department for that day.

The Concord Public Library is not open yet. Carpenters are still making changes to the interior, and the building will not be opened again until the work is nearer completion.

Mr. H. T. Blackwelder arrived home Monday from Gold Hill, where he held a revival meeting. There were about 25 conversions at the meeting Sunday night. Mr. Blackwelder stated.

Everette Rankston, one of the best players who ever performed in the South Atlantic League, has signed with Charlotte again and played his first game Monday. He had been holding out for more money.

The condition of Mr. M. S. Varner, who has been critically ill at his home on Crowell street for several days, is reported today as unchanged. Little hope for Mr. Varner's recovery has been entertained during the past several days.

The weekly meeting of the Concord Rotary Club will be held this evening at the Y at 6:30 o'clock. New officers will be installed at the meeting, at which time Tom Lawrence will preside. The meeting tonight will take the place of the Wednesday meeting.

Good progress has been made recently with work on the new high school building. The favorable weather of the past several days has made it possible for the brick masons and carpenters to rush their work, and the structure is now taking on a definite shape.

A number of baseball fans of this city went to Davidson Monday to see the Wildcats in action against V. P. I. Davidson won the game 8 to 4, though pre-game dope favored the Virginians to win. The Davidson team has been playing good ball during the past several games.

The school at Rocky River will close on Friday, April 27, with the following exercises: Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Graduating Exercises, followed by a Tom Thumb Wedding and a play on Friday night. A picnic supper will be served. The public is invited to these exercises.

Workmen have started the erection of a new building on the site adjoining the Dove-Bost Company and the W. J. Glass Company. The old building on this site was torn completely down and brick masons this morning started working on the new structure, which will be a modern one in every respect.

Mr. M. L. Widenhouse, former clerk of court for this county, is acting as deputy clerk to John B. McAllister during the present session of Cabarrus Superior Court. Mr. C. A. Robinson, who served as deputy sheriff of this county for a number of years, is again serving in that capacity while court is in session.

Farmers in every part of the country are taking advantage of the good weather now and much ground has been turned during the past week. A Concord man who went to Albemarle Monday stated that in every field he passed he saw several persons working and the farm people seem determined to make up for the delay caused by wet weather.

Hundreds of persons attended the funeral of Edith Wilson Umberger, which was held in Mt. Olive Church Monday afternoon. Rev. W. A. Rollins presided, assisted by Rev. Mr. Swearingen, of Kannapolis, Rev. J. Frank Armstrong, of Concord, and Rev. L. A. Thomas, of Concord. Interment was made in the cemetery at Mt. Olive. The child died Sunday night in a Charlotte hospital.

If the weather will permit the Kannapolis high school baseball team will play the locals this afternoon at 3:30 at the Gibson Mill Park. Friday afternoon at the same place and at the same hour the Baden team will come here for a game with the locals. Kannapolis defeated the locals last week and the Concord boys will enter the game this afternoon determined to get revenge.

Dead Man Found in Derelict Row Boat.

New York, April 23.—The motor boat Traveller, steered by a dead man, with a bullet in his chest, was caught by longshoremen today as she emerged from beneath a Hudson river pier and headed for open water at full speed.

Its lone occupant lay on its back across the steering wheel, his weight steadying the rudder. A pistol and two loaded cartridges were on the bottom of the craft. The absence of empty shells led police to believe the man had been murdered. He has not been identified.

Carolina Team Hitting .267.

Chapel Hill, April 24.—Carolina's batting average has fallen from .330 in the first three games played to .267 including all six. But this is not considered discouraging by students here. The team has been against unusually good pitchers in these last games and most of their hits have been long and clean.

Collins, who has only been to bat once and hit safely, leads the column, and Griffin, with one safety out of two attempts, comes second. Among the regulars Bryson, Gibson and Coffey come first with a mark of .333 each. Shirley's average has dropped some but still is high with .320. McDonald also is hitting at the same rate. The team has played six games, made 30 runs and secured 56 hits for an average of .267.

Among the 56 hits McDonald has hit two doubles, Shirley two, and McLean, Donner, Bryson and Gibson one each. The team has also four triples to its credit. Shirley got two of these and Morris and Sweetman the other two.

Three home runs stand out among the hitting figures, too, Donner, Sweetman and Morris got these. This record gives Carolina a total of 56 hits, nine of them doubles, four triples and three home runs for a total of 82 bases in six games. Students

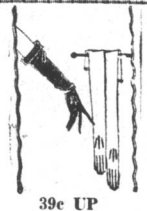
